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WILSON WANTS TO ESTABLISH WARLESS PEACE

BELIEVES MEXICANS CAN BE RECONCILED TO THEIR OWN AFFAIRS.

PRESIDENT HATES WARFARE

Intervention to Be Last Resort But Executive Is Confident That Peace Can Be Established in Mexico by Bringing Two Factions Together Without War or Without Any Bloodshed.

Mexico City, July 24.—It is understood that the Heurta government is overthrown and the Constitutionalists plan to name de Labarra provisional president, with Governor Carranza of Sonora, leader of the present rebellion, as a candidate for the presidency at the October election.

Washington, July 24.—Confident that no real effort was ever made to reconcile the differences between the federal government of Mexico and the constitutionalists, President Wilson plans to undertake the role of peace-maker. After a conference with Ambassador Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan, Saturday, the president will summon the senate and the house leaders to announce his plans and ask their support. It was learned that the president was unalterably opposed to an intervention except as a last resort. He believes that the differences can be reconciled.

Settlement Hour Opportune. President Wilson hopes that the elements behind President Heurta and General Carranza will unite and eliminate the brigandage and restore order. All information received at the executive office indicates that the rank and file of Mexicans are weary of the blooded and the president believes that this is a splendid chance to arrange a settlement.

The state department dispatches indicate that the situation in Mexico continues unabated with little information as to which side is winning.

Bacon Confirms the Report. Following a conference with the president, Senator Bacon confirmed the report. No definite announcements of the administration will be made until Ambassador Wilson reports.

The war department denied that they were preparing to mobilize the army.

Mexico City, July 24.—A crushing defeat of the liberals and the capture of Torreon by rebel forces lead by Governor Carranza, are the latest reports from the front. General Alvarez the federal commander, dispatches say was killed in battle. Thousands of federal troops with cannon were captured. Nearly all the loyal government soldiers were later slain. The rebel victory is reported possible through the federal soldiers aiding the rebels. Five thousand rebel troops are reported advancing to San Luis Potosi and a clash is expected. If the rebels are victorious they will undoubtedly continue their march to Mexico City.

Sayre Home Selected. Williamston, Mass., July 24.—It is reported that Jessie Wilson, daughter of the president and Francis Sayre will make their home here after their marriage. Mrs. Wilson is scheduled to arrive this afternoon to visit the wife of President Garfield of Williams college. It is reported that Sayre is to be Garfield's secretary.

CHARRED BONES LAID IN GRAVES

MANY VICTIMS OF TERRIBLE FIRE BURIED TODAY.

Only Six of Total of 65 Identified This Forenoon.

Binghamton, July 24.—With only six bodies of the total number of 65 victims in the Overall company fire Tuesday identified, a great public funeral of the charred remains was held today. As far as possible each body will be buried in a separate grave.

Effort Made to Identify Dead.

Only charred pieces of the remains of bodies are at the morgue here. The authorities are collecting the trinkets from the ruins in the hope of settling definitely the identity of those who were cremated. The subscriptions of interments are pouring in and the mayor announced that no outside aid would be needed, as they will inter their own dead.

Germans Eat German Oysters.

Berlin, July 24.—A patriotic public appeal was formally made throughout the German empire today asking all Germans to cultivate the habit of calling for German oysters instead of the English and Dutch varieties. The appeal was made through the government fishery office. The appeal sets forth that the "Royal Prussians," grown in the government beds off Schleswig-Holstein, are in every respect as toothsome and wholesome as their more popular foreign rivals.

Los Angeles, July 24.—To acquaint himself in detail with the fair offered by Los Angeles harbor as a naval base Secretary Daniels made a tour of the Los Angeles water front today.

HALF MILLION DOLLAR LIBEL SUITS STARTED

PHILADELPHIA NORTH AMERICAN WILL BE ATTACKED FOR EDITORIAL.

MULHALL STORY NEARS END

Several Metropolitan Publications Must Stand Trial for Libel Suits It Is Promised by Officials of Manufacturers' Association—Statement "Criminal Conspirators" Stings.

Washington, July 24.—The first of what threatens to be a series of suits against metropolitan newspapers for caustic comment on officials of the Manufacturers' association as a result of the Mulhall testimony before the insidious lobby quiz, is promised by Attorney Nevin today. Stung by an editorial appearing in the Philadelphia North American, officials of the association, through Nevin, today announced a half-million dollar suit would be instituted tomorrow. Nevin asserts the paper last Monday referred editorially to officials of the association as criminal conspirators. He threatens to bring suit against other publications and declared many others are exceeding the latitude of press freedom.

Mulhall was again put on the stand today, but the end of the hearing is in sight so far as direct examination is concerned.

Attorneys for the manufacturers are undecided whether or not to contest the committee's ruling that cross examination of witnesses must be conducted through written questions which shall be submitted to the probers.

Monotony of the probe was broken this afternoon by a spirited clash between Mulhall and Senator Cummins. It came after a letter was read in which Mulhall declared he conferred with Cummins over a speech Senator Kenyon made on the eight hour law.

"That's a lie, you know it," shouted Cummins.

Mulhall insisted every word of the letter was true, but Cummins denied he ever met Mulhall before he appeared before the committee.

Famous Author's Son Appeals.

Atlanta, Ga., July 24.—The federal parole board which convened here today is expected within the next few days to render a decision on the request made by Julian Hawthorne, son of the famous American author, for a parole. Hawthorne is serving a term of a year and a day for fraudulent stock operations.

DON'T KILL DOG THAT HAS BITTEN YOU, IS BEST ADVICE

To shoot a dog that has bitten any person is the height of folly according to medical authorities and during this season of the year when rabies are likely to develop and persons are liable to be bitten, the greatest safeguard that can be carried out is to imprison the canine that has inflicted the wound. LEMON INDUSTRY MUST HAVE PROTECTION TO SURVIVE, IS CRY

Washington, July 24.—Senator Weeks of California, declared today that the lemon industry in his state must have protection if it is to survive. The produce statistics show the lemons cost the grower, when delivered in the eastern markets, just \$2.75 a box, while the Italian lemons can be delivered at the same market for \$1.21.

He also discussed the proposed tariff reductions on olive oil, walnuts and other products.

Weeks Tells Why Not. Why he considers the tariff bill a poor substitute for the Payne tariff was told in the senate today by Weeks of Massachusetts.

Senator Weeks declared that the reduction of tariff would not reduce the cost of living, that it would not curb the trusts or cause a farther distribution of wealth.

Increases Due to Population. "The increased cost of living," said Weeks, "is due to the growing density of the population. The American working man can buy twice as much with one hour's work as could be purchased a century ago. The British

workingman can buy less than the American and the German workingman less than the British workingman."

Weeks insisted that the proposed reduction in the tariff would curtail the mills and reduce the income of the workingman.

"No special consideration for the people of California," he said, "but simple justice."

Lee Girls' Case Queer.

The recent drowning of the Lee sisters at Portland, which came as a great shock to their many friends of Pendleton, where the girls had lived during their childhood, will be further looked into by Portland authorities says the Pendleton Live Wire.

The strangest feature of the accident is that the canoe is a non-capable boat equipped with spousons. Expert canoeists say these boats will tilt to the water's edge and will not turn over. Another unaccountable feature is the fact that the two men had no cries or sound from their companions after they hit the water, but the rescuers declare that both the young men were greatly excited and for some time could not tell a connected story about the accident.

Impressed with the idea that the full and accurate details of the events leading up to and subsequent to the tragedy have not been satisfactorily brought to light, Coroner Slocum's office is making an investigation this morning.

The funeral of the Misses Lee will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:00 o'clock from the Christian church. Rev. T. F. Weaver, pastor, will officiate.

George Hayes for Governor.

Little Rock, July 24.—The reports of the election here indicate that George Hayes was elected governor of Arkansas by a majority of 25,000 votes.

POWERS HOPE TO APPORTION THE HOLY CITY

AMBASSADORS GIVE FURTHER CONSIDERATION TO BALKAN PEACE.

ENGLISHMAN VIEWS CRIME

Bringing Back Tales of Heathenish Practices by Bulgar Soldiers, Englishman Corroborates Stories of Atrocities Coming From Scene of War—Babes Bounced on Soldier's Bayonets.

London, July 24.—The ambassadors held a conference again today on the Balkan situation. It is not expected that they will decide the status of Adrianople but the discussion is expected to pave the way to further conferences, when it will be finally decided what part the Turks will be allowed to retain of the recaptured Holy City.

Gruesome Crimes Recited.

Athens, July 24.—Confirmation of the reported Bulgarian atrocities at Seres and Doxato was given by Commander Cardale, of the British navy today. Cardale said he had personally counted 1200 corpses of old women, men and children at Doxato. Many of the children's bodies were pierced through, indicating that the Bulgarians had tossed them up and caught them on their bayonet points.

Coyote Bites Man.

Baker, July 24.—To be bitten by a coyote is not a usual occurrence, especially if one is perusing his ordinary vocation, and yet this is what happened to Ray Boyd yesterday.

Mr. Boyd lives with his family on a homestead near Sparta. Yesterday morning he started afoot across his land to bring in the cows, and as he walked leisurely along a fullgrown coyote slipped up behind and bit him severely through the fleshy part of the thigh. With great effort Mr. Boyd frightened the animal away. But this is not all that happened, with the coyote playing a leading part.

Mr. Boyd started for his home but the coyote beat him to it proceeded at once to (and did) whip the house dog and had captured a chicken and was devouring it when Mr. Boyd rushed into the house and secured a gun with which he slaughtered his coyote-ship.

UNIONS CHAFE UNDER DELAY

QUICK ACTION OR FIGHT IS ULTIMATUM.

Eastern Railroad Brotherhoods Insist On Speedy Settlement.

New York, July 24.—"Talk business quick or fight," is the stand taken by representatives of employees of eastern railroads to compromise differences with railroads through medium of the government mediation board.
