WHEAT CROP FOR NORTHWEST TO SET NEW MARK THIS YEAR

The Pacific northwest will this season harvest 75,500,000 bushels of wheat. This is the second largest crop ever produced in the state of Oregon, Idaho and Washington. So far as the latter two states are concerned the 1913 production of grain is the greatest ever ready for gathering.

Record yields of wheat are shown in the light land sections of the inland empire this season. Only unfortunate weather at the start of the season kept the three states from breaking every previous record in wheat production. As matters stand, the crop is most satisfactory when the output of the three northwest states is merged.

One remarkable feature of the present grain crops season is that the light lands will, as a rule, produce even bigger crops than the so-called "better sections." This is due to the fact that during the spring months a very unusual amount of moisture was received in the light land sections, this being the only drawback from producing a big crop at any season.

The Big Bend, the Palouse, Eureka Flat and the Camas Prairie countries, all come in for their share of the praise of producing the biggest cereal crop ever known in their respective sections. The growths of wheat along Eureka Flat in Walla Walla county were uniformly heavy this season. Yields of 30 to 35 bushels per acre were quite common in this light land section that but a few years ago was considered almost entirely worthless from an agricultural standpoint. There are fields on Eureka Flat that are today harvesting 40 to 50 bushels averaging per acre but naturally they are exceptions instead of the rule.

In the heavy land sections of Oregon and Washington, this year's crop of wheat, while still above the average for 10 years, is somewhat below that of last season. In the foothill section of Walla Walla county considerable loss in grain will be shown as a result of the great increase in weeds this season.

The same is true of the famous reservation section of Umatilla county, Oregon. The weeds there are thicker than they have been for many years but despite this both Walla Walla and Umatilla counties will this season gather about 5,000,000 bushels of wheat each. The showing in Walla Walla county is about 500,000 bushels better than the so-called record crop of a year ago, although in Umatilla county it is about that amount less than a year ago.

The reason for this increase in one big county and a decrease in another is apparent. In Walla Walla county the light lands produced their best crops this season while in Umatilla the showing in the light ground or west end of the county, was extremely poor when compared with a year ago, although the crop there is a very good average for 10 years.

Oregon wheat fields as a whole produce a much smaller crop of wheat than a year ago. This year's crop is estimated at 19,150,000 bushels as compared with 25,231,000 bushels a year ago. There were two big reasons for the decrease in the state's output of wheat this season. The principal reason was the very serious decrease in the acreage, it being now estimated that the planting this season of spring and winter wheat combined is fully 25 per cent less than a year ago.

A poor start was likewise one of the big drawbacks for the Oregon wheat crop this season. Stooling was far lighter than usual and this together with an unusually cool spring and a lack of moisture in the light land sections when it was most needed, brought down the year's totals somewhat from the record output of a year ago.

What is true of the central Oregon country this season is likewise shown in the Willamette valley. The acreage of wheat in the valley this season is fully 40 per cent less than a year ago. What grain was planted, has generally shown a very good condition during the season. The output per acre will fully come up to that of any recent year.

There will likewise be a bigger crop of barley gathered in the Pacific north-

west this season. The total for the three states is 15,750,000 bushels or within a fraction of 1,000,000 bushels more than a year ago, despite the fact that in the state of Oregon a decrease of 500,000 bushels is shown as compared with a year ago.

Everywhere in the Pacific northwest—Oregon, Idaho and Washington—there was a record crop of hay this season. This applies to practically all varieties and especially alfalfa.
