

CALUMET MOB QUIET IN FACE OF MILITIAMEN

TROOPS CONTROL SITUATION IN STRIKING MINING TOWN TODAY.

STRIKERS WELL ARMED

Fear of Bloody Conflicts is Admitted as Automatic Revolvers Have Been Given to Strikers and Presence of Militiamen May Later Cause Trouble—Special Troop Trains Come.

Calumet, Mich., July 25.—Five hundred militiamen are patrolling the streets to prevent a repetition of yesterday's disorders when an armed mob of striking copper miners disarmed 50 deputies of their stars and virtually took possession of the city. Twenty five hundred militiamen are expected to arrive by tomorrow. Rioting prevailed last night and scores are in the hospitals with broken heads.

Strike May Extend to 40,000. It is considered possible that the strike may extend to 40,000 iron miners in Marquette and Gobic mineral range. The officials of the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company say that the miners are not dissatisfied but that they are being organized by the western Federation of miners.

Practically all the strikers are armed with automatic rifles and revolvers and it is feared the coming of the militia will serve to inflame them.

Martial Law Will Be Declared. Lansing, July 25.—It is authoritatively learned today that martial law will be declared after noon in the copper regions, where 25,000 are striking if the rioting continues. Governor Ferris is expected to arrive this afternoon and take personal charge of the situation. Thirty mines have been affected by the strike order.

Special Trains for Troops. Adjutant Vandercok has announced that it is arranged to run special trains, for the troops, to Calumet. Some of these will cross other states en route. Permission has been obtained from governors of Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin. The troops carry three days' rations.

WEBB BILL EVADED. Japanese Form Land Companies of Fifty-year Duration.

San Francisco, July 25.—Hoping to defeat the intent of the Webb anti-Alien land law by forming incorporations, and later transferring stock to Japanese, land companies are being incorporated at the rate of 20 per day. The Japanese are forming 50 year companies, believing their lands will be secure at least as long as they live.

New Judge Takes Oath. Seattle, July 25.—Judge Jeremiah Neterer, whose appointment was confirmed by the senate Monday, will take oath of office as federal judge of the Western Washington district Wednesday next. The oath was administered by his associate on the bench, Judge Cushman.

GREEKS TAKE STRATEGIC STRONGHOLD FROM BULGARS Athens, July 25.—Dispatches were received which confirm the reports of the capture of Kresna Pass, an important strategic point, by the Greeks from the Bulgarians, after a four-days' battle in which the Bulgars were outnumbered. The losses on both sides were appalling. Greece notified the Porte that the reported Turkish massacres would make impossible the resumption of diplomatic relations.

King Constantine Framing a Reply. King Constantine and Premier Venizelos are framing a reply to King Charles of Roumania, saying that the Greeks will consent to an armistice

SMALLEY TO ENACT DAREDEVIL STUNT SUNDAY.

ELECTROCUTED LADY BURIED

ENTERPRISE WOMAN MEETS A STRANGE DEATH.

Damp Floor, Extension Wire, and Fall Spell Death.

Enterprise, July 25.—Yesterday afternoon the remains of Mrs. Louise Bauer Hollenbaek, who was electrocuted at the home of her father, Jake Bauer, was held in this city. A large gathering of friends paid the solemn and last respects to a very popular citizen of Enterprise. She is survived by her husband and three children, the oldest of which is about five years of age.

Mrs. Hollenbaek, who was a young woman, was killed while after some fruit in the cellar. The basement floor was damp because water had leaked up from the cesspool, and in order to reach the desired section of the basement, she had guided herself with an extension cord from an electric light. It is believed that the insulation had been defective and that Mrs. Hollenbaek stumbled about the same time that she seized the wire, and struck her head severely in the fall for when found, her head was bruised. The wet floor, the fall and the defective insulation probably made up a combination that caused death for the current of electricity was not sufficient to cause death without the dampness of the floor.

It was during the morning that Mrs. Hollenbaek had gone to the basement and search for her was instituted when she failed to return. It is believed she must have been dead a period of two hours before being found. Her hand was burned severely for after death the wire had been forming connections that carried the electricity through the body.

DIPLOMAT IS HOME AND HIS POSITION GONE

FREELY ADMITTED THAT INDIANA MAN WILL SUCCEED AMBASSADOR.

NO CHARGES PREFERRED

American Ambassador to Mexico City Who Has Been Called Home to Give First Hand Report of Situation Will Not Be Sent Back—John Lamb Will Be the Temporary Representative.

New York, July 25.—Ambassador Wilson, who was called home from Mexico City by President Wilson, arrived on the liner Mexico today, and started for Washington this afternoon to confer with President Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan on the situation in Mexico.

Bryan Returns to Duties. Washington, July 25.—Bryan returned to his duties today to find the general situation in Mexico much improved. After a conference tomorrow between Ambassador Wilson, the president and Secretary Bryan, it is the intention to send John Lamb of Terre Haute, Indiana, to Mexico as the American representative to check the situation.

If a new ambassador to Mexico is named Lamb will undoubtedly be the man but no formal charges are lodged against Wilson.

More Revenue for Farmers.

Washington, July 25.—Removal of the restrictions which prevent the farmer from utilizing his waste fruits and vegetables to manufacture denatured alcohol on his property may soon be accomplished. Several congressmen today informally discussed plans for changing governmental rules which now prohibit the manufacture of this fuel. The secretary of the treasury has been approached on the subject and it is his opinion that no new law is required to permit the farmers to operate a distillery for the production of alcohol to be used as a fuel. He said today that merely abrogation of a present rule is all that is needed.

"All of the many wormy potatoes, apples and other farm products that are unfit for sale can be turned into alcohol, which is more economical for fuel than gasoline," said Senator Lane of Oregon, today. Senator Lane is heading the movement to have the rule abrogated. "In Germany," he continued, "they raise potatoes for the special purpose of distilling them. To be permitted to do this would mean not only much cheaper fuel for the American farmer, but also a new source of revenue, for he could readily find a market for the alcohol he did not use."

Women as Reservists.

Paris, July 25.—It is not improbable that, in time of war, the women of France will furnish to the army seven regiments of fighting men by taking up the clerical duties that number of officers and enlisted men are now performing. Speaking of the plan, in a letter to the minister of war, Mme. Dieulfeff, wrote the following:

"In the army alone, 2672 officers have their hands tied by duties which keep them off the firing line, and 5000 non-commissioned men are similarly employed. Why not instruct women along the necessary lines and when war is declared, let them take up the pens dropped by the troopers who can thereby grab their guns and sabers? If France is to get ahead of the of the Austrians and the Germans this is the plan to adopt. And when it is adopted I want to be the first woman called for the great honor of serving my country. I should deem it a priceless honor to bring to France my small aid. It matters not in what capacity I am asked to serve; it matters not how humble the task."

SUFFRAGETTE DEMONSTRATION AFTER RAID ON DOWNING ST. LONDON.



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Miss Parkhurst who was sentenced to three months' imprisonment for inciting the mob has been released from jail as the result of a hunger strike.

A party of militant suffragettes in a demonstration at Trafalgar Square, London, after a raid on Downing street, where are situated the official residences of the ministers. The attack was led by Miss Sylvia Parkhurst.

Besides carrying the usual banners with the "No Vote, No Tax" mottoes the militants introduced an innovation and carried with them revolutionary caps on poles, which may be seen in the accompanying photograph. In the Downing street riots, dock workers joined the women and rioted with them. It was only after a considerable display of force that the police were able to disperse the mob. Broken up in Downing street, the suffragettes and their allies adjourned to Trafalgar Square and later speeches were made from the Nelson Column.

Miss Parkhurst was arrested for her part in inciting the mob to disorder and on July 8th was sentenced to three months' imprisonment. July 14th she was released from Holloway Jail as the result of a hunger strike.

TROPHIES FOR WINNINGSTOCK

HORSE AND CATTLEMEN WILL DRAW PRIZES.

One Elegant Cup to Be Given Winner of Motorcycle Race Sunday.

Three elegant loving cups, trophies for prize winners in the county fair stock exhibits and one cup for the winner of the motorcycle race next Sunday are on exhibit today in the H. T. Love jewelry store. The largest of the three is a beautiful affair standing about 17 inches high, and will go to the winner of the grand champion stallion in the county fair this year. Another trophy, but a little smaller than the largest, will be awarded to the winner of the grand champion bull at the fair, and the third trophy, of the same size as the second-named, will be presented to the winner of the motorcycle race, so that there will be more than the cash consideration for the winner.

NEW REPUBLIC OF CHINA IN DIRE STRAIGHT

SEVEN BIG PROVINCES IN REVOLT AGAINST NEW REGIME.

GOVERNMENT TOTTERING

Yuan Shi Kai's Reign May come to Sudden End—One Hundred and Fifty Million People Have Revolted Against New Order of Things in China—Shanghai Dispatches Hopeful Still.

Pekin, July 25.—Dispatches from Shanghai, Canton and Nanking, which are received, show that the president, Yuan Shi Kai, is facing a rebellion which is more than likely to cripple his rule and perhaps cause the disbursement of the Chinese republic. All seven southern provinces with a population of more than 150,000,000 are said to be in open revolt. The Shanghai dispatches are hopeful for the government.

Battles involving thousands, are reported as being in progress.

Rebels Capture Nanking. A Shanghai dispatch reports the rebels are steadily attacking the arsenal, but that the government forces are at least holding their own. It is believed at Shanghai that Nanking is in the hands of the rebels. There is no direct news from Nanking and this leads to the belief that Shanghai dispatches are true. Canton dispatches say that an army of 10,000 left there to fight the northerners. From a score of other sections of the empire the news of revolt is coming in.

PUGILIST SLAYES LOVER.

Spurned In His Love Affections He Seeks Bloody Vengeance.

San Francisco, July 25.—Furious because she refused to accept his love, Joe Archer, a pugilist shot and killed Lillian Fenatard as she lay in bed at her lodgings here tonight, and then shot himself to death. When entrance was gained to the room both were dead.

"You made me love you, now I've got to have you," were Archer's words as he dragged his victim from her bed, she screamed help but he fired five shots through her body in rapid succession, then reloading the weapon he sent three bullets into his own heart.

Record Entry In Regatta.

Marblehead, Mass., July 25.—A record entry list in the mid summer regatta of the Corinthian Yacht club of Marblehead, was shown when the program of the events which began August 4, was announced today. One of the largest pleasure fleets ever seen in this harbor will assemble here on that date and remain until the program concludes five days later.
