WATER SPOUT RUINS GRAIN

MEDICAL SPRINGS COUNTRY IS DAMAGED.

Area of Water 6 Miles Long Formed in Salt Creek.

Medical Springs, July 25.—A water spout on Salt creek near Medical Springs at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon did considerable damage to hay, growing crops, gardens and irrigation ditches.

Salt creek at this time of the year runs dry but after the water spout nearly eight feet of water rolled down the stream taking out two bridges.

Upon leaving the canyon the waters spread covering the crops of William Burke and Jim Childers. Wynne Duncan, living in the Silas Turner place, is the heaviest loser, as nearly \$2000 damage was done to his irrigation ditches, washing away the banks and filling the channels with rocks and silt. The water rose to the level of the house depositing mud and slime on the floor.

George Stout, who was returning from Baker with two wagon loads of supplies, got one team across the bridge before the waters rushed upon him, but the other wagon had to be left on the other side of the stream.

W. J. Miles, road supervisor of that district is in Baker today in regard to rebuilding the bridges. Mr. Miles spent all of last night in hanging lanterns on the bridges and warning travelers that the road is impassable. He says that the roads in that district will not be in condition to be used by automobiles or teams for several days although horseback riders may do so. There are many rocks in the road which will make the bad for travel all summer.

He says the water flooded an area of six miles for two hours filling all the four ditches of the lower Powder. He and his brother, J. S. Miles, were great losers as their oats and other crops are gone. Their ditches are also gone so that a second crop cannot be raised. They estimate their loss at \$1,000 and the damage to roads will be a like amount. Childers' loss will also be great.

Mr. Miles had a narrow escape when he tried to drive on the Salt creek bridge. The water had undermined the approach and horse and rider sunk into a hole. Miles jumped to safety and by quick work extricated the horse. The work of the water was quick for William Holcomb had ridden over the bridge in safety only 15 minutes before. Burt Vandever was on his way to his home near Medical Springs but was warned and kept his team and loaded wagon on the bank.
