Miss Margaret O'Malley, of Portland, who has been visiting at the P. J. Theisen home for the past few weeks, returned to her home this morning.

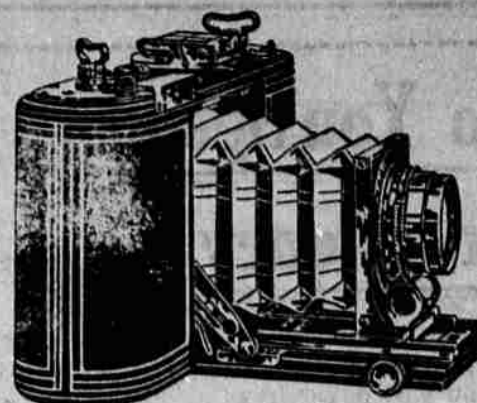
