Rebels Reported Routed. Mexico City, July 28.—A wireless to Monclova says that 700 rebels are killed and 1000 wounded as the result of an eight hour battle that ended yesterday near Coahuallila. General Maas of the cavalry is declared completely routed the rebels. The federal loss is not estimated.

The battle started when the federals surprised the rebels and captured 30 cannon and took many prisoners. They also seized a big supply of stores in the store house.

The rebels said that there was a condition of utter demoralization scattered over a wide area with the victorious federals in pursuit.

Spoiled Hay Is Valuable. Attention has recently been called by the Oregon Agricultural college to the fact that many farmers who are so unfortunate as to have hay injured or spoiled by rain are making the mistake of either burning it in the fields or letting it rot in piles. It is stated that spoiled clover or alfalfa hay is worth \$5.50 to \$10 per ton as fertilizer if evenly spread over the fields and plowed under, and that every ton of hay so worked into the soil is approximately worth four tons of fresh manure. A ton of clover hay contains 40 pounds of nitrogen, 5 pounds of phosphorus and 30 pounds of potash, which, if purchased in the open market would cost the farmer about \$10.50, and as clover and vetch is yielding about 2 1/2 tons per acre this season, the plowing under of the spoiled hay adds a fertilizer value of not less than \$25 to each acre.

Another Battle Reported. Eagle Pass, Texas, July 28.—Confirmation of the reports that Mexican constitutionalists captured the town of San Luis Potosi, a city of 80,000 population near Mexico City, were brought to the city today by refugees. They say the battle raged two days, 100 soldiers on each side were killed.

An army of 4000 rebels is expected to attack Saltillo this week, then the entire force will concentrate in a single army to attack the capital.

More Fighting Reported. Belgrade, July 28.—The Serbian war office issued a statement today, declaring that the Bulgarians had attacked the Serbian force at Egipalanks but were repulsed with a heavy loss.

Her great grandsons today presented papers to the city authorities which prove beyond any doubt that their grand mother was 109 years of age. So far as is known she was the only person living who had personal recollection of Napoleon Bonaparte.

According to her great grandson Philip Norminsky, 830 Pearce street, at whose home she died, more than 200 direct descendants, including several children, eleven grand children and seventy-four great grand children in this country today are mourning her death. Norminsky says there are three children, twelve grand children and at least ten great grand children living in Russia.

Russian and Hebrew with the aid of glasses and her hearing was excellent. Up to two years ago she had lost none of her teeth. She learned to speak English fairly well after she came to America and often expressed a wish to live until Pennsylvania granted women the vote.

Mrs. Vidietzky was born at Shemlingov, Russia, in 1804. She says that she was nearly run down by Napoleon himself, on horseback, when she ran across the road.

Mrs. Vidietzky came to America after the death of her last husband when she was 99 years old. She made the voyage in the steerage. She was married four times, having divorced her first three husbands. The aged woman up to the day of her death aided her great grand daughter-in-law with the housework. She read
