UNDER ARREST

TRAP PLACED BY TWO MEN CAUSES ARREST.

Men Held For Grand Jury to Act— "Beans" Found on Table.

In the justice court yesterday, the efforts of the county officials to stop what is felt to be more or less constant petty gambling in the city, were partially successful, when Justice Williams bound over to await the action of the grand jury on fifty dollars bonds Walter Smith and Peter Hudson, colored, on a charge preferred by Sheriff Hug. The hearing developed that the bootblacks had fallen for a trap planned by one H. O. Smith, who confessed himself without money, in conjunction with S. T. Boothe, of La Grande. Smith sought out the colored defendants Sunday and interested them in "getting" a rube who had a lot of money to "drop". A date was fixed and Sheriff Hug was taken in on the matter by Smith and Boothe. Boothe, dressed as a foolish rube, appeared and helped Smith get the colored boys into the game, but they having noticed the officers around were rather slow to embark. However, when, half an hour later, the sheriff entered and apprehended the crowd he found cards and "beans" upon the bed in front of the participants. The sheriff arrested the colored players Smith and Hudson, and placed a charge of gambling against them.

After considerable scrambling among the friends of the defendants, they were able to give bail to answer, in case the grand jury should indict them.

Back From Here.

A clipping from the Alton Telegram, of Alton, Ohio, the former home of Rev. A. G. Lane, pastor of the Presbyterian church of this city, tells of his sending some Grande Ronde cherries to friends. This is how the paper there marvels at Grande Ronde cherries:

A package came by express this morning to C. A. Caldwell of the Alton National bank, which consisted of branches from a cherry tree sent by Rev. Dr. A. G. Lane, who is at La Grande, Oregon. The cherries grew to the tree in such a manner that they were regarded as curiosities by all who saw them, and the people who received them are all of them 80 years of age or more. The special variety of cherries which Dr. Lane sent grew with their stems attached direct to the wooden branches of the tree, and not to smaller twigs as cherries hereabouts grow. The branches Dr. Lane sent were covered so thick with the fruit that it was impossible to see the branches and one aged woman who received a branch at first thought that the cherries had been put on the branch by some human artist and she was admiring his great skill until she was told that it was Nature that had done the curious work. The best description of the manner of the cherries were attached to the tree is they were like bananas growing on the branch. Trees bearing cherries in this manner would certainly hold a much larger amount of fruit than other trees. The fruit was large and luscious. Each branch was about 18 inches long and was thickly studded with red fruit.

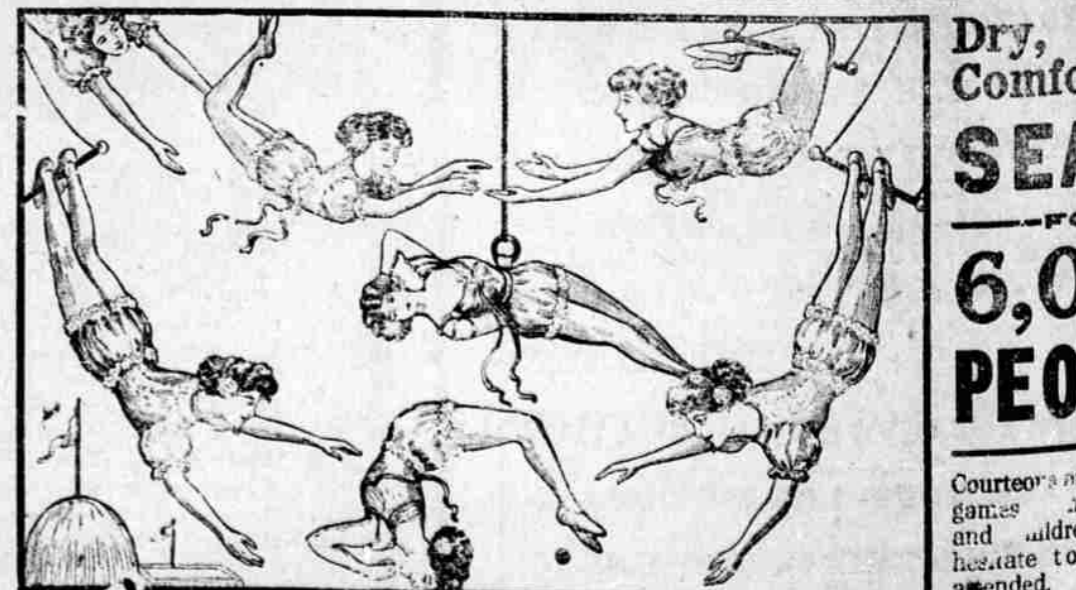

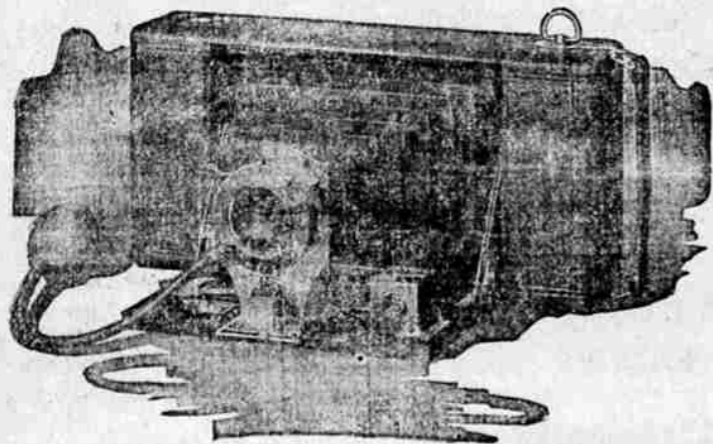
