NO RELIEF IN SIGHT FOR WEEK AT LEAST.

Cantaloupes Will Come From Payette in Two Weeks Maybe.

If present guesses are correct it will be a week or 10 days before water-melons are again put on the local market. Word from Portland dealers who stand between the grower and the local dealer, is to the effect that the shortage continues and La Grande need not expect melons for a week at the best.

It will be fully two weeks, it is believed before Payette cantaloupes will get on sale. The variety handled now comes from California and because of long shipments, are, of course, not so choice and luscious as will be the Payette varieties.
