Washington Ready for Suffragettes

Washington, July 30.—Plans were completed today by suffrage leaders and city officials for what is expected to be the greatest suffrage demonstration ever seen in the capital city. The chief event will be the parade and pageant in which wives of senators and representatives in the national legislature and other prominent women will take part. The line of march will be from the rendezvous, Hyattsville, a little hamlet in Maryland, eight miles from the capitol building, west on Pennsylvania avenue and past the White House. The latter route is the one attempted during the parade on March 3, last, when hoodlums insulted the fair marchers without hindrance by the police, and for a time broke up the parade. Admitting that he has learned his lesson, Major and Superintendent Richard Sylvester, declared today that he will have all the streets roped off—something he failed to do on March 3—and that extra details of police will be stationed along the line of march.

Poincare to Visit Alphonso.

Paris, July 30.—President Raymond Poincare, it was officially announced today, will visit King Alphonso at Madrid in November, returning the visit that monarch paid to France and the French president last May. There is talk that the exchange of visits between the Spanish, French and English sovereigns was for the purpose of inducing Spain to join the Triple Entente. That France and Spain will join hands regarding all Moroccan matters, is already a foregone conclusion, according to authoritative diplomatic sources here.

70 ACRES OF WHEAT BURNS.

Largest Umatilla Grain Fire for Several Seasons Near Adams.

Pendleton, July 30.—The largest grain fire in Umatilla county for several seasons occurred yesterday afternoon about two miles west of Adams. A high wind was blowing when fire sprang up in the I. A. Christophe field on what is known as the old Pat Ryan place. It was in wheat that is threshing from 40 to 45 bushels of wheat per acre and it burned over about 40 acres before it ran off this place and into the J. J. Roustone field lying immediately east of it, where about 30 acres were burned, making a total loss of 70 acres, or about 3000 bushels of wheat, or about \$2250.

Mr. Christopher says that he has no idea what started the fire. It may have been a spark for the engine though the fire was a considerable distance from where the engine was working, or it might have been caused by matches being dropped or by a cigarette that some one had surreptitiously been smoking. It just seemed to spring up into a vigorous flame at once and spread with great rapidity.

An alarm was given for miles around and farmers from all over the country rushed to the help of the fire fighters in gangs, and by having plenty of water and several hundred sacks, which were dipped in the water and used to beat the flames, it was whipped out, though it looked for a time as if from 600 to 700 acres of grain would be destroyed.

Mr. Christopher estimates his loss at somewhat in the neighborhood of \$1200, about two-thirds of which is covered by insurance, being written in the Queen Insurance company through the local agents, Bentley & Leffingwell of this city. As C. D. Gabrielson, the adjuster for this company, is in the city at this time, the loss will probably be adjusted this afternoon.

Washington, July 30.—It is reported that the grand jury is investigating Mulhall's confession in connection with the perjury charges made by former Congressman Watson and it is reported that the jury examined Watson.

Allies Sign Armistice.

Bucharest, July 30.—Bulgaria, Serbia, Greece and Montenegro signed a five days' armistice today, the representatives of the several countries agreeing to hold a peace conference during that period.

Poisonous Chewing.

One of the troubles of most European armies is that those soldiers who can get hold of it insist on using that terrible explosive cordite as if it were a sort of chewing gum. Its popularity is due to the fact that when chewed in small quantities it has a stimulating and exhilarating effect, like small doses of alcohol. Its taste, too, is sweet, cordite being three-fifths nitroglycerin and an explosive which is sugary to the taste. When chewed in large quantities cordite becomes more powerful in its effects, bringing on a blissful state of ecstasy and sometimes making the victim of the habit see visions. But the real danger of the habit lies in the fact that though nitroglycerin will only explode when given a very hard blow or touched by an electric spark, there is always a possibility that the grinding of exceptionally hard teeth might provide the necessary hard blow. Within the last few years at least three soldiers—two German and one Austrian—have been blown to bits, the use of cordite as a chewing gum being the suspected cause.

Shy, but Ferocious.

No European has ever been able to meet in their own dwelling places the Kukuhulus, a shy, yet ferocious tribe of New Guinea. Other tribes of the country, while they have a great fear of the Kukuhulus, manage to do a bartering trade with them. They bring salt, earthenware, dried fish, etc., and deposit them in a certain indented place. They then retire for a few hours, being notified to do so by a curious cry from the distance. The mountain dwellers then descend to view the goods offered for sale. If they want them they put down other goods, such as skins, fentlers and other jungle produce, next to those articles wanted by them. Then they retire in turn, and when the way seems clear the coast dwellers approach again. If the latter are satisfied with what is offered in exchange they take the goods put down by the mountain people and go away; if not satisfied they retire again as before with empty hands.—Argonaut.

Currency Bill In Dispute

Washington, July 30.—Leading insurgents and conservatives in the house banking committee have appealed to Secretary of State Bryan in the hope of reaching a common ground for the handling of the currency bill. Representatives Henry Balkely and Ragsdale, members of the committee all sought Bryan's support. Bryan told his interviewers that he endorses the principal features of the Glass-Owen bill and that he refuses to dip into the factional fights but he is willing to effect some agreement. He then asked the different factions that they get into harmony.

Haines Murder Story False.

Baker, July 30.—Stories of a shooting and attempted murder at Radium springs night before last, which were circulated here yesterday, when simmered down to the facts seem to have resulted from the domestic troubles of a man and wife living there.

It seems as near as can be learned that for some cause or other shots were fired late in the evening, but the developments seem to indicate that they were fired from a window for the purpose of frightening some of the people involved in the affair, rather than to kill or injure. On complaint of the husband the woman in the case was arrested by Sheriff Rand and is now being held.

The outcome of the affair seems somewhat uncertain owing to the vague nature of the charges preferred and the more or less mystery surrounding the whole proceedings.

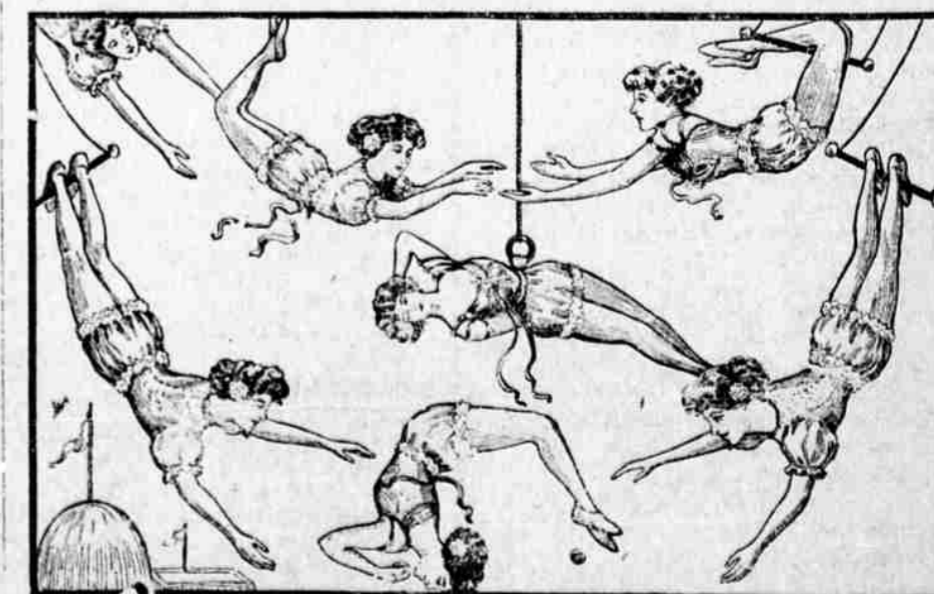
