HEMPE HEARING CONTINUES.

H. R. Hanna is Federal Examiner in Union Water Case.

A hearing that is expected to require from three to six days to complete was started at Union today, wherein the Amalgamated Sugar company is aligned against Hempe and some 30 others over riparian rights. The testimony in the case is being heard before H. A. Hanna, of this city, who is the special examiner for the federal court in which the case has jurisdiction. Attorneys Cochran, Wilson and Finn are counsel in the case.

Jewel Thieves Hunted.

Narragansett, R. I., July 31.—Arrests are expected within a few hours of the robber or robbers who, within the last week have stolen jewels valued at a quarter million. Detectives on the case indicate that a woman either a society "Raffles" or a servant is the suspect. Three in all are suspected and it is reported that arrests may come soon.

All the trio are being watched, every moment, and the detectives hope to recover the stolen jewels.

Delay Denied Telephones.

Portland, July 31.—Federal Judge Bean today overruled a motion for extension of time to file an answer of Judge Cary, counsel for the telephone companies that are defendants in the government dissolution suit, filed here last week. He ordered the companies to have their pleading in court not later than September 15th.

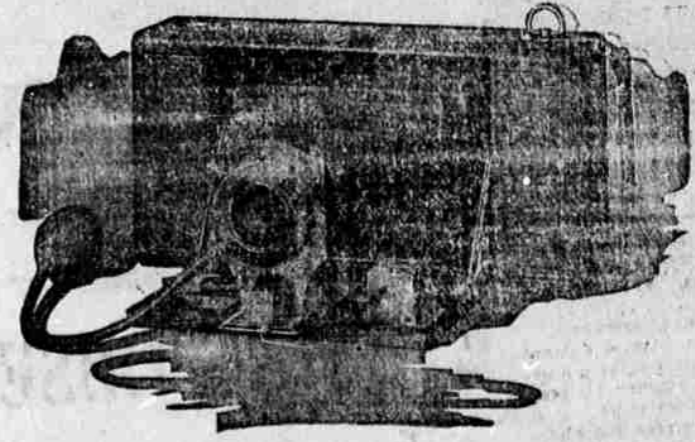
