SEVERE STORM ROILS WATERS

WALLOWA RIVER MUDDY AFTER CLOUDBURST.

Storm Plainly Visible From Wallowa Strikes Mountains.

MUDDY WATER DEPLORED.

La Grande fishermen, by the score, will deplore the muddy condition of Wallowa river tomorrow as several had planned to go and will probably postpone their trip because of the high water.

Wallowa, Ore., Aug. 1.—One of the worst cloud bursts ever known in Wallowa county occurred last Thursday evening in the mountains south of Wallowa and Lostine. Considerable wind accompanied the downpour. Friday the water in the Wallowa river and Bear creek, which is usually clear was so muddy that the water in the hydrants was just use for almost the whole day. Although the sun was shining brightly in the valley the storm could be easily seen near the mountains from town.

NEW LAW ON HUNTING OUT

DEER SEASON OPENED YESTERDAY IN THIS DISTRICT.

Many Changes Noted In Laws Governing Hunters This Year.

Since the new law governing deer season became effective, hunters are digging out the new codes and acquainting themselves with the new order of things. To be able to hunt deer in the height of the summer season is a novelty and there seems some dispute as to the probability of any hunter landing deer for in the recesses of the mountains, sheep are up, hence deer are down; dry twigs preclude the possibility of silent march.

The sage hen law is also open and some local mammals brought down the bag limit yesterday.

Some of the abstracts from the new game codes copies of which are ready for free distribution at the hands of A. O. Wenzel—a member of the Wing, Fin and Fleetfoot club are appended:

- Local sportsmen will find it is always unlawful—
- To kill mountain sheep, antelope, female Chinese pheasants, Reeves' silk, beaver, female deer, spotted fawn pheasants, Hungarian partridges, prairie chickens, bobwhite quail, swan and all non game birds except predatory birds.
- To hunt without hunting license on person.
- To hunt at night.
- To disguise sex or kind of any game.
- To hunt over with dogs.
- To sell game of any kind.
- To shoot game from public highways.
- To waste game.
- For aliens to hunt without special gun license.
- To shoot from any power, sink, or snare trap.
- To hunt on enclosed lands without permission of owner.
- To trap without license.
- It is unlawful for aliens to hunt and angle without first having obtained a \$25.00 gun license and both hunters' and anglers' licenses.
- It is always unlawful:
 - To sell or have in possession plumage of protected birds.
 - To hunt on any game reservation.
 - To lie in wait near ticks while hunting deer.
 - To sell game of any kind except when procured according to law.
 - To hunt rules between February 15 and September 15, excepting by permit from game warden.
 - To have in possession more than 25 pounds of jerked venison.
 - To trap, net or ensnare game animals, birds or fish, except as expressly provided.
 - To hunt within the corporate limits of any public school, college or university, or within the boundaries of any watershed reservation, as established by the United States to supply water to cities, or within any national cemetery, or on any campus or grounds of any city or town, public park or bird or game reservation.
 - To assist game warden or other officers charged with the enforcement of game laws.

birds—30 in any seven consecutive days.

Quail—10 in any seven consecutive days.

Silver gray squirrels—5 in any seven consecutive days.

Deer, with horns only—3 during any open season.

A partial abstract of game fish laws is:

Open season for trout over six inches—April 1 to October 31; bag limit—75 fish or 50 pounds in any one day.

Open season for trout over 10 inches—All year; bag limit, 50 trout or 50 pounds in one day.

Open season, hook and line only bass, crappies, Williamson's white fish, cat fish and graylings—All year; bag limit 40 pounds in one day.

It is always unlawful to angle for any fish without having a license on person and to refuse to show same on demand of proper officer.

To fish by any means other than by hook and line.

To cast lumber waste, dye, chemicals, decaying substance, etc., or to use powder or poisonous substances in streams.

To fish at night or within 200 feet below any highway.

To sell trout, bass, crappies, cat fish, white fish or grayling.

To maintain an irrigation ditch without having it screened at the intake.

Additional provisions of game laws: All game is owned by the state.

Any game animal, bird or fish raised in captivity may be sold if properly tagged.

Any game animal or bird may be held during closed season if properly tagged.

Any game animal or bird may be imported from without the United States and sold if properly tagged.

Any navigable stream and any streams flowing through public lands are highways for fishing.

Taxidermists must hereafter pay a license of \$3.00 per year.

The state board of fish and game commissioners are empowered to summon and examine witnesses, under oath, to suspend open seasons, offer rewards to apprehend violators and to acquire any kind of game for propagation, experimental or scientific purposes.

Any person killing any mountain sheep, mountain goat, antelope, elk, or moose, may be fined from \$200 to \$1,000, and imprisoned not less than 60 days nor more than six months.

Unless otherwise provided, violations of other sections carry penalties of not less than \$25 or more than \$500 and costs, or by imprisonment not less than 30 days or more than six months.

Besides fines, anyone violating laws shall be subject to a civil liability ranging from \$2.00 for each game bird to \$100 for elk and mountain sheep.
