Elgin Potato Grower Believes Harvest Will Be Rich This Year.

Elgin's potato belt is slightly reduced in acreage this year but will no doubt yield fully as many carloads as last year, according to Walter Henry, a potato grower, of the Elgin belt who was in the city this morning. The stand of spuds at this time is immense and indications from outside districts indicate that Idaho, Colorado and California will not be up to the yield of last year, principally because of curtailed acreage. Elgin spud growers who stayed with the game will reap a rich harvest barring unforeseen accidents.

FIRST CONSIGNMENT DUE IN FEW DAYS.

Scarcity of Berries at Hand and Dealers Can't Fill Orders.

BERRY CROP CLEANED OUT.

Housewives who neglect to order berries early are going to have trouble for their is already a scarcity of all sorts of berries save probably black caps. Within a few days the supply will be all gone as grocers are having trouble now filling orders. Bing cherries are practically out of the market; Royal Anns are gone and Lamberts nearly so. Only scattering shipments are received.

Eagle Valley tomatoes are not far off.

Reports from the famous tomato fields are to the effect that the crop is ripening fast and that the advance shipments will reach local dealers within a short time but it is thought the main bulk will not be due for some little time to come. The Dalles and other near-great tomato districts are supplying the local consumers at present.

Green roasting corn is now selling for 35 cents per dozen.

The greatest slump of any commodity of food stuff in the past few days is that taken by cucumbers. Field grown cucumbers are selling for 10 cents, which a week ago brought 25 cents for two.

A number of hog shippers coming into the Portland Union stock yards recently, instead of feeding wheat and corn en route, fed potatoes. Melins Payne, of Tikura, Idaho, tried the experiment recently with good results. Another shipper from Idaho claimed that with potatoes he came through without a pound shrink in his whole shipment. On account of the high water content potatoes are especially valuable to shippers in the hot weather.

Some feeding experiments with potatoes follow: Ford of Copenhagen station found by experiment that 400 pounds of potatoes are worth 100 pounds of mixed grain for pig feeding. In trials by Henry at the Wisconsin station, potatoes were cooked in an open kettle, using as little water as possible, and corn meal added to form a thick mush which was eaten by pigs with great relish. Corn meal wet with water was fed to a second lot for comparison. The results were as follows: 400 pounds of corn meal, fed alone, produced 100 pounds of gain. 262 pounds of corn meal with 786 pounds of potatoes, weighed before cooking, produced 190 pounds gain. From this we learn that 786 pounds of potatoes, when fed to hogs after being cooked, effected a saving of 178 pounds of corn meal. 442 pounds of potatoes taking the place of 100 pounds of corn meal.

From an average of 41 analysis in Farmers' bulletin No. 222, we obtain the following for the potato: Water 79.1 per cent, ash .9 per cent, crude protein 2.1 per cent, fiber 0.4 per cent, N-Free extract 17.4 per cent. Fat 0.1 per cent. Henry gives the digestible nutrients as crude protein 1.1 per cent, carbohydrates 15.7 per cent, fat 0.1 per cent.

Burned Man Recovering.

Pendleton, Aug. 5.—F. O. Walman, the separator tender who was badly burned about the hands and face in the fire Friday afternoon, which destroyed the stationary thresher of Ely Enbysk, is reported recovering from his injuries at the local hospital. According to Mr. Enbysk, who is in the city today, Mr. Walman was oiling the machine when the explosion occurred and the flames flared up in his face. Had it not been for his goggles, his eyes might have suffered, he declares. Mr. Walman is a brother-in-law of Mr. Enbysk. Mr. Enbysk has not yet decided whether he will buy a new machine or not.
