in Washington who every summer add considerably to their incomes via the chautauqua route, do not command the big prices Secretary Bryan does, they manage to make enough by their lectures to pay a lot of bills and still have quite a nest-egg left over. Secretary Bryan is said to be the highest priced lecturer on the circuit. He is reported to get between \$200 and \$300 every time he raises his voice in silvery-toned oratory before a chautauqua audience. Other chautauquaters of the congressional and statesman set it is declared, command on the average of from \$100 to \$200 per lecture. Senator Bob La Follette and Speaker Champ Clark are close on Secretary Bryan's heels in the matter of popular esteem as lecturers. Both of these gentlemen are among the marooned in Washington. Both, when it was seen that congress would drag along, cancelled their dates and stopped thinking what they would do with the money. Senator La Follette has found time to keep a few of his lecture dates, but they were mighty few. Representative Victor Murdock, the fiery haired Progressive house leader from Kansas, is also a great drawing card on the platform and he said today that he hates to think about the money he isn't making "on the side" this summer. Senator Ollie James

used to do quite a bit of lecturing during the summer months but of late years, since he rose from the house to the senate, he has done very little on the chautauqua circuit. Still, he admits having arranged to exchange three or four talks this summer for "spare change," as he put it, and he is another one whose "side money" has been sadly dented.

Whip J. Ham Lewis and majority leader Mann are the Simon Legrees of this summer session of the national legislature. Hardly a day passes that some Democratic senator doesn't go to one of them with a long tale of woe about breaking down and needing just a week or just a few days of rest and relaxation. But Senators Kern and Lewis were well chosen for their task. They can rip into an excuse or a plea, tear it to pieces and cast it smashed and mutilated to the floor without the flicker of an eyelash while some beseeching fellow member stands pleading for a slight recess almost with tears in his eyes. Not a senator in Washington today who has suggested a brief vacation only to be sternly rebuked but believes that somewhere back in the past, Kern and Lewis could find an ancestor apiece who was either a slave driver or commander of one of the ancient slave galleys.

Nearly a score of senators, clinging to the hope that congress would get through in time, made bookings for trips to Europe, fixing their sailing dates late in July or early in August. All, without exception, have had to cancel them. The only thing left for the solons are week end trips and the

moving picture shows. And the week end trips in Washington are mighty few and far between.

Yes, it's a hard life, this being a statesman. The baseball games are about the only thing to amuse these hard-worked, perspiring, tariff making legislators. There is some talk here of passing a law forcing the Washington team to play all its games at home whenever there is a summer session of the legislature.
