CURRENCY BILL NEAR.

Caucus to Last All of Next Week—Then Vote.

Washington, Aug. 6.—The prediction that the house will pass the currency bill by September the 15th, at least, is the latest announcement made by Representative Glass, chairman of the house banking and currency committee in charge of the measure.

Representative Ragsdale will open the fight in the house Friday advocating an "agricultural currency plan" The currency caucus is expected to continue all next week.

Washington, Aug. 6.—The following nominations were sent the senate by President Wilson: Minister to Venezuela, Preston McGoodwin of Oklahoma; federal judge for the district of Arizona, William N. Sawtelle.

Largest Salmon.

Seward, Alaska, Aug. 6.—The largest king salmon ever caught in Alaskan waters and probably the largest in the world was delivered at the canneries here along with the regular catch. Minus its head, the fish weighed 113 pounds. It was taken at Port Conclusion.

Contests for King George Cup.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, Aug. 6.—The King George Cup, the most coveted yachting prize of the empire, was the chief event of today's racing in the famous regatta which is attended by King George and Queen Mary, and King Alfonso and his queen.

New Head of Baker Schools Arrives.

Baker, Aug. 6.—City School Superintendent A. C. Strange, Mrs. Strange and daughter, Frances, arrived yesterday afternoon from The Dalles and are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Smith. Mr. Strange will spend the first few days in Baker becoming acquainted with its citizens and conditions relative to school work.

The first work which will confront him will be the revision of almost the entire course of study, both in the high school and in the grades, made necessary by the adoption of the many new text books recently.

In an interview with the representative of The Herald this afternoon relative to the policy he intended to pursue, Mr. Strange said:

"I have not been here long enough to say much regarding my future plans. My first endeavor will be to learn all conditions here. Before coming to Baker I had a long conversation with Professor Churchill regarding the work here, and I shall continue along the course he mapped out until I thoroughly familiarize myself with surrounding conditions. Naturally, as school work advances, I shall move forward, making such changes as I feel will benefit the schools. No radical changes will be made, however."

Will Liberate Two Thousand Pheasants

Pendleton, Aug. 6.—Twenty-four pairs of China pheasants raised by the state on the state's game bird farm at Corvallis, were liberated here this morning by Harry Telford, deputy under warden Finley, and E. F. Averill district game warden. The pheasants were turned loose on the reservation just east of Pendleton. Four dozen pairs of Chinese pheasants were liberated there last year and are declared to be doing well. The birds are protected against hunters, as hunting is absolutely prohibited on the reserve.

While in eastern Oregon Mr. Telford will visit at Pilot Rock, Weston and Athens to inspect sites that are suggested near those places for game reserves. It is the intention to stock them later. En route to Pendleton Mr. Telford stopped off at Stanfield and left a dozen pairs of pheasants in care of G. L. Hurd to be liberated on a reserve there.

The official title of Mr. Telford is inspector of the conservation department and his work is chiefly in connection with the propagation and distribution of the game birds. He has headquarters in Portland but is familiar with the work on the farm at Corvallis.

"This year the farm raised 2000 China pheasants, all of which are to be distributed in eastern Oregon. This year in addition to the China pheasants the farm also raised 125 golden pheasants, 75 silver pheasants and 450 Reeves pheasants."
