

EXPERTS CENTRALIZED ON 1913 FAIR DEPARTMENTS

Men and Women Assigned Positions as Heads of Departments—County Fair Aspect Is Highly Pleading.

It's going to be "some fair" that Union county will have this fall, from October 8th to 12th. People of the whole county are going to join hands and boost for the very highest such in the fair history. Many hours before the opening they will see the people in charge of the various sections busy at the task of putting everything in order and getting ready for the monster exhibits that will grace the exhibit hall at the grounds. The fair this year will be bigger and better than ever before and contrary to the usual "circus, bigger and better." This "bigger and better" means that all exhibits will be doubled and tripled that a competent person is to be given charge of each department—a person who understands and is thoroughly familiar with the work before him, and one who will give his every effort to bring his division of the exhibits to the top rung.

Children Will Profit.

Special attention will be given to the children's exhibits this year. They will be given a department or a division of the hall all to themselves and under the able and skillful direction of Mrs. Schiller and it is sure to prove the most popular and beneficial department of the fair, and why not? Will not those children who exhibit so generously their handiwork today on the ones who will manage the fair tomorrow? To the girls who are ambitious to make for themselves a reputation as good householders a special invitation is sent that they begin early to plan their exhibits as there will be unlimited room and an open door to all.

Another important feature which has been added to the programs of so many fairs recently is the emphasis on the baby contest. This will be given under the personal direction of Miss Walker, the managing head of the nurses at the Grand Bonds hospital. Last year's trial of this sort of baby contest was well liked and using as a base the success of the first venture the promoters this year feel confident of a large number of "bucky" entries.

Art to Get Attention.

To those who are especially interested in the art department the Fair association sends word that there will be an extensive division given over to this sort of work in charge of an able manager in the person of Mrs. E. E. Senham.

Wooded Mazes "Hoses."

Of course it would not be proper to go much farther into a county fair program without mentioning the "hoses" and other stock. J. A. Woodell has been placed in charge of a department which will include horses, cattle, sheep and swine. Grande Bonds valley has always held up her end of

the stick when it comes to stock and this year it is to be no disappointment for already enough stock has been secured to make the fancy stock owner gasp. And the exhibit in all its various divisions promises to be a record breaker.

Over the groups, grass and vegetable division Ed. W. Jasper has been given authority and will give his time and attention to the many minor details which accompany such a department.

Huffman Is Fruit Boss.

To A. D. Huffman, the well known independent farmer, has been given the fruit exhibit and those who know Mr. Huffman will feel sure that no better man could have been found for the place as he is thoroughly familiar and widely read on the subjects which will come under his division. The fruit exhibits this year will be the choicest of the valley and this exhibit will probably cover more territory than any other individual exhibit, and the handsome entries will tempt many a homeseeker.

Expect Poultryman Secured.

The poultry and pet stock entries will be given into the care of C. E. Perry who is well versed in this line and will arrange a fitting exhibit for his division. Mr. Perry is also superintendent of the poultry department at the state fair this year, so that in his services the contestants are assured the best protection.

N. K. West Handles Races.

N. K. West, whose stock has reputation over all the northwest will be in charge of the racing at the fair. In addition to being one of La Grande's leading merchants, Mr. West is a fancier of purely bred stock and owns the much famed Commonwealth stock ranch, which is at present stocked with pure bred animals. Mr. West was formerly owner of a number of coast record standard bred horses; and is a man who will fill the position assigned him with an able, grace and efficiency which insure success.

Over all the above named superintendents of various departments and divisions a general superintendent has been placed, George C. Hopkins of this town being given this generalship. Under this able and efficient corps of workers, who, as Secretary Secor said, "have been selected as persons who are well versed in the particular line of work assigned them, and who will give their time and attention to making their department a huge success," the Union county fair of 1913 is going to be a record breaker, a winner of the kind that comes into the last stretch not just a few inches ahead of the others, neither and wheeling with a determination never to try again, but a winner of the kind that comes in as a steady leader of the race, and with a steady, unbroken stride crosses the

line a winner by yards, and carrying the assurance that the same thing can be done again.

BIRD LOVERS GIVEN JOLTS

AUDUBON SOCIETIES FEEL THE BLOW IN SENATE.

Sub-Committee Headed by Hoke Smith Turns Down Bird-Saving Bill.

Portland, Aug. 8.—(Special)—Oregon Audubon society, Dr. E. J. Welby, secretary of Portland, Ore., has issued the appended statement:

Bird lovers throughout the United States, who have, for the past two months, been making a determined effort to prohibit the use of wild bird plumage for millinery purposes, have just met a decisive defeat in the Finance committee of the United States senate.

At the beginning of the present session of congress, an amendment was added to the tariff bill preventing the importation of feathers, quills, beads, wings, tails, skins, or parts of skins, of wild birds, either raw or manufactured, which were not used either for scientific or educational purposes. This provision did not apply to the feathers or plumes of domestic fowls of any kind.

This amendment passed the house of representatives and would pass the senate had the wholesale milliners not brought enough influence to change the senate committee on Finance. The passage of this amendment would be the greatest step in wild bird protection that has ever been taken.

"There is no logical reason why wild birds should be slaughtered merely for use as fancy millinery, especially when these creatures are of economic importance not only in the United States but in every country in the world," says Mr. T. Gilbert Pearson, secretary of the National Association of Audubon societies, who has been making a hard fight for bird protection. "It has been proven many times that wild birds are Nature's check against insect pests. As these wild birds are shot off, vast armies of insects are taking their places. Not only have a number of species of highly plumaged birds in the United States been on the verge of extermination, but many species are practically gone in different parts of the world merely to satisfy the demands of the millinery market."

When this amendment passed the house, a powerful lobby was organized among the wholesale milliners in various parts of the country. Two firms of New York lawyers were employed. So aggressive has been the campaign that the amendment which gave protection to wild birds has been defeated by the finance committee of the United States senate, although one would think this should carry from a humane standpoint.

The three senators who have stood by the wholesale milliners in their fight to continue the slaughter of wild birds have been Hoke Smith, of Georgia, William Hughes, of New York, and Charles A. Johnson, of Maine. These men were on a sub-committee of the senate committee on Finance, to which the matter was referred. They rendered a favorable report and their report was ratified in a caucus of democrats which has just been held, so when the tariff bill comes to the senate, it will mean defeat for bird lovers throughout the country unless other bills, now on the way, can be brought to bear upon the above named committee.
