TIMBER SAGE VISITS CITY

GEORGE M. CORNWALL BOOSTS FOR "CONGRESS"

Explains Some of the Wonders of Modern-Day Logging Science.

Geo. M. Cornwall, editor of the Timberman of Portland, and secretary of the Pacific Logging congress, was in La Grande today en route to Hot Lake, where a meeting of the Western Pine Manufacturers' association will be held. A delegation from Spokane arrived this forenoon on a special car to attend the meeting. Mr. Cornwall states that the eighth session of the Pacific Logging congress will be held at Spokane, Wash., September 24-27. The congress will present among its other interesting papers the practical utilization of the cable tramway in the transportation of logs. Also the value of electricity as a motive power in log haulage. A trip will be made to the camps and mills of the Potlatch Lumber company at Potlatch, Idaho, where the practical utilization of a cable tramway, 1 3/4 miles in length may be witnessed conveying logs to the railroad. The Potlatch company is also using very successfully two electric logging engines in their camps. The logging congress is carried forward with the sole idea of attempting to standardize the methods of logging and elevate this part of the lumber business. The congress embraces its membership the representative logging and lumber firms within the state of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, California and British Columbia. It is hoped within a very few years to have the various higher institutions of learning institute courses in logging engineering in connection with their courses. "Logging," says Mr. Cornwall, "is an engineering problem, pure and simple. It requires a very high grade of man to operate successfully the modern logging camp with its railroads, donkey engines and other steam and electrical equipment. The use of the ox and horse teams have passed, we are within the steam and electrical age. We must train our young men for the profession of logging engineering just as we train specially men in mining, hydraulic and other branches of engineering. There is a new field for honest endeavor. Oregon has 4000 timber than any state in the Union; estimated at over five hundred billion feet. The annual cut is now almost two billion feet, so you see there is little likelihood of the lumber industry soon ceasing to be the most important industry in the state. The Oregon Agricultural college is taking steps to prepare for logging engineering courses. The state of Washington, in connection with the University of Seattle, has done some very creditable work along this line. British Columbia intends to establish courses in logging engineering in connection with their new university which will be in operation in two years. Idaho, Montana and California institutions of learning are giving the subject of logging engineering considerable attention. Experience has demonstrated that the boy who graduates from the Agricultural college is generally at least a more scientific farmer than his father, who did not have equal opportunity for study along practical and scientific lines. The same idea we feel will hold good in the teaching of logging engineering. Quite a large delegation of Eastern Oregon lumbermen will attend the congress at Spokane. "In fact," says Mr. Cornwall, "the Eastern Oregon lumbermen have always been the most active supporters of the idea of standardizing the logging business."

MORE RARE CHERRIES.

Local Un-irrigated Tract Produces Marvelous Bing Cherries.

Marvelous clusters of cherries have been exhibited in this city this year but it is doubtful if a finer specimen has been produced than that found by J. G. Snodgrass last evening on the Snodgrass orchard near the Poor farm. The orchard, to make the crop and special clusters all the more rare, has not been cultivated with any degree of diligence or has it been irrigated during the summer. The county fair officials will attempt to get a similar cluster to pickle and have on exhibition at Secretary SeCor's office during the summer.
