### ASYLUM CONTRACT LET.

**Pendleton Firm Obtains Contract for New Asylum Work.**  
 Pendleton, Aug. 12.—Through contracts let by the state board to L. Monterestella of this city three buildings, costing a total of \$20,000 are to be erected at the Eastern Oregon State hospital and arrangements are being made today for undertaking the work. The buildings are to consist of a superintendent's cottage which is to be built across the railroad track in front of the institution and a dairy barn and a pig sty, both of which will be located west of the institution. The money for these buildings was appropriated last winter but owing to the ninety days' intermission for the referendum did not become available until three months after the close of the legislative session.  
 In securing the contracts for the hospital building Mr. Monterestella competed against several firms from Portland and elsewhere. His bid was found to be the lowest.  
 Today the contractor along with some of the officials of the hospital staff have been going over the ground preparatory to the beginning of work. Dr. McNary, superintendent of the hospital, is still at Salem.  
 The work of laying concrete walks around the state hospital is now in progress and when these walks are completed and other landscapes betterments made the appearance of the institution will be greatly improved.
