NECTARINES NOW ON SALE

GRAFTED IDAHO FRUIT ARRIVES
IN CITY.

Sour Grapes Plentiful—Watermelon
Orders Filled at Last.

Idaho nectarines, the hybrid fruit that is produced by grafting plums on peach trees, have reached local merchants in small quantities. The offerings are not quite as ripe yet as the fastidious might desire but the size is there in good uniformity.

Along the nectarine offerings this week comes grapes—not Tokays but a sour variety that many fancy and use with much satisfaction. The rush on watermelons yesterday was brisk indeed and unless the wholesalers have more in sight there will be another famine started. For once however everybody had enough for one day.

Cattle Trading Brisk.

Union Stockyards, Portland, Ore. Aug. 12.—There was the usual heavy run of stock at the yards thus far this week.

In prices the showing for yesterday was a little less satisfactory, but this in part at least was attributable to the poor quality of a good deal of the stuff moved. The best steers put up this morning brought \$8.35, while a few others but little less desirable were turned over at \$8.25, which gave evidence of a fair demand for quality beef material. Most of the steers moved, however, were more or less off in grade and went at prices running from \$7.25 to \$7.75.

The few cows worked off yesterday morning went at \$6 to \$7. In the market on veal stock there was nothing doing, but values were said to be holding.

Several large lots of sheep and lambs were disposed of and for the most part at prices within the range last quoted.

The hog market showed a distinctly easier tone. One load of lightweights early in the day sold at \$9, and this in some quarters was believed to be about the limit obtainable. Heavy hogs were moved at \$8.
