## BARTLETT PEAR DESTROYER OF WEEDS FOUND

### GREAT DEMAND GIVEN AS THE REASON.

**Eastern Markets Clamor for World's Best Bartlett.**  
 Portland, Ore., Aug. 14.—Fully seventy-five per cent of the Bartlett pear crop of the Rogue river section has already sold at the highest average price over obtained for the valley's growth within the memory of the oldest grower. The average price to date secured by the Northwestern Fruit exchange is \$1.85 per box, while the highest average per box heretofore has been \$1.53.

Announcement was made today by W. F. Gwin, head of the selling force of the Northwestern Fruit exchange that the expected production of Bartlett in the Rogue River valley was placed at 41 cars while 24 carloads have actually been confirmed as sold and 10 cars have been sold but were not yet confirmed by the exchange.

The highest price received for the Rogue River Bartlett this season was \$1.95 a box. Only one load brought this figure, but a number of cars went at \$1.90.

The fact that practically 75 per cent of the Bartlett pear crop has been sold two weeks before the crop will be ready to ship, is the result of the high reputation that the Oregon fruit has in all of the leading markets of the country. All of the leading cities of the east have vied with one another to secure these supplies of the world's best Bartlett and this has resulted in the obtaining of such extraordinary values.

### NEPHEW WILL WED AUNT.

**Entanglements in Family Will Then Be Something Awful.**

Los Angeles, Cal. Aug. 14.—Emil Oriva, twenty-three, Los Angeles, to Pauline A. Oriva, twenty-three, Portland, Ore. That's all that was recorded on the marriage license by Clerk R. S. Sparks, but later he drew up his belt, flushed a few times and scratched his head. Then he tried to figure out the Oriva family tree.

This is what will happen when the marital knot unites Mr. Oriva and Miss Oriva: Miss Oriva's brother will become her father-in-law, Miss Oriva's sister-in-law will become her mother-in-law, Miss Oriva by marriage to Mr. Oriva marries her own nephew and gets a husband at the same time.

### Bug Causes Disrobing.

Walla Walla, Aug. 14.—Maidenly blushes and feminine screams mounted high in an interurban car when a big black bug crawled into a peek-a-boo shirt waist worn by a pretty Walla Walla girl, whose name it would be unkind to mention after what happened.

Unable, though assisted by several girl friends, to remove the bug, and driven frantic by its explorations, she tore off the waist and shook out the horrible thing. Three or four pairs of French heels put it out of the world.

The car was filled with picnickers from this city. The girl was one of a party of four young men and four girls. A swarm of bugs flew into the car. Most of them were driven out by the young men, but one remained, a student of lingerie, as it developed. And, as other explorers into mysterious regions have done, he laid down his life. His name is said by the scientific sharps to be "Pterostichus Carabidae."

When the panic began, the young men, realizing that they could be of no further service, considerably turned away or hid their faces in their hands. It is reported but not substantiated that not one man in the car looked or peeked through his fingers.

After the bug had been disposed of, the girl friends of the mortified young woman hastily helped her to get back into the remains of the peek-a-boo shirt waist, and one of the young men gallantly loaned his coat.

### IRON SULPHATE WILL KILL THE WEEDS QUICKLY.

**Does No Damage to Green Leaves and Grasses, However, It Is Said.**

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Aug. 14.—When properly prepared and applied iron sulphate spray not only destroys weeds of most kinds but leaves grains of grasses among which it is growing practically uninjured. While very effective in preventing threatened damage to crops from vigorously growing weeds it cannot be made to take the place of rotations, cultivations, summer fallow and other weed preventative measures. Neither should its use be attempted on weeds growing in clovers or other broad leaved crops as it will destroy them as well as weeds. Following is the method of use, as presented in detail by Professor H. D. Scudder, agronomist of the Oregon Agricultural college.

"The iron sulphate used as a spray has been thoroughly tested both by experiment stations and the manufacturers of the sulphate. When properly prepared and applied it has proved destructive to dandelion, yarrow, sorrel, mustard, lamb's quarters, peppergrass, bull thistle, wild carrot, pigweed, shepherd's purse and wild daisy. It will not destroy dock, which can be eradicated only by digging the plant out or cultivating it to prevent its going to seed. When used to destroy dandelions on lawns it will injure the white clover. And it should be remembered that this spray cannot be safely used on weeds growing in any broad leaved crop as it will destroy the crop as well as the weeds.

"The value of this spray as a destroyer of weeds lies largely in the fact that it can be applied and the weeds killed while they are growing in the grain crop. The spray will not destroy grains or grasses because of its limited area of action on their narrow linear leaves, while it will destroy the weeds named, largely because of its wider area of action on their broad and succulent leaves.

"As now sulphate is a powerful salt its action is similar to that of an alkali in the soil, causing the leaves upon which it falls to dry up, turn brown and die.

"The effectiveness of the spray depends mainly on four things: First, it should be applied during dry sunny weather, for if rain washes off the salt within two or three days it is not effective. Second, it must be applied with a sprayer, which will deliver the spray forcibly in a very fine mist, so that the weeds will be covered as completely as possible. Third, the spraying should be done on a quiet day. Fourth, the spray should be applied to all weeds just before they bloom.

"The spray is prepared by dissolving 10 pounds of iron sulphate in 52 gallons of water. It should be made up fresh each day in wooden barrels and the sprayer should be wood, rubber or brass. The solution will stain clothes, and the hands should be protected by being creased with vaseline.

"Ordinarily for mustard in wheat fields one spraying is sufficient. On more persistent plants, such as the dandelion, the spraying must be repeated when the plant comes up again. Flax or wheat may be sprayed without injury to the crop when from six to 12 inches in height. Later, the mustard or other weeds are likely to be too difficult to reach with the spray owing to the shading of the grain."
