

LAD OF 18 MEETS DEATH

KEATING MAN SHOT WHILE
HERDING SHEEP.

For Several Days Hunt Continues for
Missing Boy.

Baker, Aug. 14.—Albert L. Ingle, son of A. N. Ingle, was found in the river bed of North Pine creek at 6:00 o'clock Tuesday morning, his heart

pierced by a bullet from a 38 caliber revolver, which he carried.

The son had been herding sheep for his father, who is a large owner, living at Keating. In company with Arthur Mills, another herder, they were in charge of a band on the mountain north of Pine creek. Mills had been crippled Saturday afternoon when a horse kicked him, and was unable to herd the flock. Ingle, who was also a cripple from a bullet wound inflicted by himself some time ago, volunteered to take care of the band.

About 4 o'clock in the afternoon a shot was heard by the men at camp, but nothing was thought of the matter until part of the Ingle band of sheep was seen heading for a strange herd. Search for Albert was immediately instituted. All night Saturday and Sunday night, the search was continued. Finally the father of the boy was notified, arriving on the scene Monday. Tuesday morning the body was recovered.

From all indications the lad had crawled through the underbrush endeavoring to kill some game, as he had slipped down the embankment a considerable distance before lodging in the bed of the creek. The revolver was found in his left hand closely clutched against his side, indicating that the shooting was accidental.

Previous to the fatal accident, young Ingle had promised his parents never to carry fire arms, since he had the first accident.

The victim was 18 years old and had a large circle of friends both in Baker and Eagle valley. He was a brilliant scholar. The remains were taken to Richland for embalming and will be brought to Baker Friday, at which place the funeral will be held from Welch & Company's undertaking parlors at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Burial will be made in the Mt. Hope cemetery.

BOTTOM GONE FROM HOG PRICE

PORTLAND YARDS WITNESS A
SUDDEN DROP.

No Particular Increase in Number of
Hogs Offered It Seems.

Portland, Aug. 14.—The bottom dropped out of the live hog market at North Portland yesterday afternoon when values went from \$9.30 to \$9.85 for tops, and only a single lot went at this figure. Most sales were made from 45c to 80c per hundred pounds less than the price of yesterday. The drop in hog market prices here this week to date amounts to more than 75c. In some instances it is as great as \$1.05. The price losses are the greatest ever known for a similar period within the history of the Portland market.

The severe loss in price is not occasioned by any serious increase in the amount of hogs marketed, because the runs of late have not been unusually extensive. Leading killers have complained bitterly recently over the high prices, and it is generally conceded that the drop is due to their united efforts. So far, no announcement has been made of a similar cut in the price to consumers.

Crawford Season at Hand.

The Crawford peach season will be in full swing at Pacific Northwest points within the next 10 days. Arrivals of early Crawford from The Dalles are now quoted quite freely with extra good quality predominating. Extra fancy stuff from there is today selling in the Front street produce trade at \$1.85 while ordinary stock is selling at former figures.

"The peach crop of The Dalles section is very good," says M. Thornton, a producer of that section in the city on business today. "The crop of late peaches promises to be very good this season with the quality splendid."

"The Dalles section has a better crop of tomatoes this season than for many years past. The acreage in tomatoes is quite heavy and the production per acre is exceptionally good. At the present time the stock shows rather good quality."

NOTICE OF PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:
You are hereby notified that the commissioners appointed by the common council, of the city of La Grande, Oregon, to make an examination of the property, upon which assessments are to be levied to pay the costs and expenses of the street improvement hereinafter described, as to the valuation and extent, if any of the benefits to be derived by said property by reason of said improvement, have made their report in writing to said council, which report has been received by said council, and is on file in the office of the recorder of said city, and is open for your inspection. That it is the intention of said council to levy a special assessment against all the property hereinafter described for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of improving Spring avenue from the S. property line of Washington avenue to the W. curb line of Alder avenue by laying thereon hard surface pavement according to the plans and specifications therefore heretofore adopted by said council and on file in the office of the recorder of said city.

That the real property included in and the boundaries of the district benefited and affected by said proposed improvement are as follows: Beginning at a point west 120 feet from the west property line of Alder street, said point being due west of the center of Block 11, Romig's addition to the city of La Grande, Oregon, and running thence east through the center of blocks 11, 8, 5 and 2 to Romig's addition and 13 and 10 to Grandy's addition, to the center line of Fourth street, thence to a point 120 feet from the north property line of Spring avenue thence east through blocks 103 and 102, Chaplin's addition, to the center line of Washington avenue; thence southeasterly along the center line of Washington avenue to the center line of Seventh street; thence south along the center line of Seventh street; thence to a point opposite the center of Block 99, Chaplin's addition to the city of La Grande, Oregon; thence west through the center of blocks 99, 98 and 97 of Chaplin's addition, blocks 11 and 12 of Grandy's addition and blocks 3, 4, 9 and 10 of Romig's addition, to a point 120 feet from the west property line of Alder street; thence north to the place of beginning, all in the city of La Grande, Oregon, and the estimated cost of said proposed improvement is \$30,134.00. You will further take notice that said city council will meet at the council chamber in the city building of said city on the 20th day of August, 1913, at eight o'clock p. m. of said day to consider making said proposed levy and will then and there grant a hearing to any and all persons feeling aggrieved against, or on account of, said proposed assessment.
