State News Brevities

Laws Satisfying Commission.
Salem, Ore., Aug. 15.—Announcement was made today by the state railroad commission that the rules to be formulated with relation to underground and overhead crossings of railroad, telephone, telegraph and power wires and with relation to which a hearing was held yesterday, will not extend to cities, which have valid ordinances now on the subject. But three cities, Hood River, Eugene and Portland, now have such ordinances, and those in the latter are said to be contested in the courts.

Another question pertaining to rules over which there is much controversy and which has not been settled, is whether guy wires should be insulated or grounded.

Lightning Plays Pranks.

Cottage Grove, Ore., Aug. 15.—Another story of the freak lightning in the Row River valley has been brought into the city by W. J. Messenger. Two trees on the Messenger place were struck, one of the trees being so severely injured that it will probably die. The lightning did all kinds of gymnastic tricks on this tree. It came straight down for quite a distance, then turned a right angle, circled around the tree a distance, turned another right angle and started down the tree again, jumped from the tree entirely for a distance of ten inches, then hit the tree again, making a big hole where it struck. Jumping from the tree it struck a pile of rails and jumped then up in all manner of shapes.

On one rail a trough three-quarters of an inch wide and half an inch deep was dug out as cleanly as if done with a chisel.

Convict Pardoned and Deported

Salem, Ore., Aug. 15.—In order that Thomas Henry Baker, serving a term in the penitentiary for larceny committed in Polk county, may be deported, Governor West today pardoned him. He arrived in Oregon on the steamship Celtic King and will be deported on the same vessel when it arrives in Portland.

Providence Man Searching for Son.

Salem, Ore., Aug. 15.—Stating that he has not heard from his son, Gordon M. Watt, since March 24, of this year, Dr. Andrew Watt, of Providence, R. I., has written Governor West asking him to assist in locating the son. He has been in the habit of writing to an aunt in New York, the letter states, and when last heard of was in Roseburg. The man is 21 years old, has a scar on the left wrist, and is of slight build.

MORE CARS TO BE BROUGHT IN

O.-W. TO HAVE NO CAR SHORT-AGE HEREAFTER.

Officials Discuss Situation Anticipating Big Business.

Appropriations for equipment for 1914 were discussed at Portland yesterday by officials of the O.-W. and that car shortage is a thing of the past in this section of the state is indicated. The story of the meeting in Portland as outlined by a Portland paper is:

President J. D. Farrell, vice president and General Manager J. P. O'Brien and other local officials of the O.-W. R. & N. company, are in session today discussing the needs of new equipment and rolling stock for the year 1914-15.

President Farrell stated this afternoon that while it will take some time to fully ascertain the requirements, the purchase of at least 1500 new freight cars, in addition to the 1000 now being delivered as a part of the order for the year 1913. This will mean that within the next 18 months the O.-W. R. & N. company lines in this state will have 2500 new box cars in service.

Investment Is Large.
The average cost of a box car is said to be about \$1000 so that the order for the 1500 will involve the expenditure of \$1,500,000. In addition thereto the company will buy other freight equipment such as flat cars and stock cars, but how many is yet to be ascertained.

The 1000 cars ordered for this year are now arriving at the rate of about 50 a day. Twenty-two locomotives included in the order for this year have already been delivered. Locomotives run high in cost, averaging about \$20,000 apiece, so that this year the company invested nearly \$500,000 in locomotives alone.

Best Service Planned.
"The company will expend a large amount of money in new equipment next year," said President Farrell this morning, "as the state is developing and business increasing. The plan is to keep right ahead of the growth so as to give the best possible service. The 100 box cars now being delivered here will aid materially this fall in preventing a car shortage in moving the large crops that have been harvested."

The company will also receive shortly 150 single deck stock cars and 100 wooden flat cars for logging purposes for which orders were placed some time ago with a Puget sound car building firm. The box cars were built in the east.
