s a hold up game from start to finish.

"I concluded when I quit the business several years ago that if I ever went into it again it would be in a different way from the old way."

Then he continues: "The idea occurred to me, 'why not let the public say how much a person in this profession should make on his goods.' Now this is a new stunt, in this profession at least; I have never heard of such, if it is not. I have selected 12 of your successful business men to say what per cent of net profit I should have on my goods. To get this I will give you the amount of \$15,000 worth of goods as sold in one year. The cost of conducting a business of this kind I will have to take from my past knowledge to some extent, and as to what a mechanic in this line is worth depends on what kind he is. I intend to get an average per cent from the men I have consulted whom I trust will aid me in this venture.

"I am not doing this to take advantage of anyone or to oblige anyone. The profession is an honorable one and I take pride in it and hope to be able to prove to the public that the business is not as bad as it is pictured."

Zeek asserts that an injunction which he obtained to temporarily at least, prevent the defendants named above from cutting some timber on a certain piece of land, was violated by these men. The Masters-Ewoldt Lumber company owns extensive timber lands up Ladd canyon and owns and operates a mill there, while the Wenaha Lumber company is this summer cutting timber on contract for the Masters-Ewoldt people.

Zeek asserts that the companies have cut certain timber in that district in violation of the injunction.
