school building at a meeting of the school board last evening. Hulme & Spaeth, local plumbers, got the job for \$5,887 and have until tonight to file their bond. These bids were originally opened a few days ago but G. M. Richards, of Portland, who was then low bidder failed to attach his check for the 5 per cent of the bid. He was derelict in filing the check and bonds when he discovered that he had made a mistake in his estimates and asked to be allowed to add to them a sum of about \$600. This necessitated all bids being thrown open again and in the second opening the local firm got the contract. Richards bid again but there was no check with the bid. Hence the home firm got the job. The work calls for connecting the Central school building with the heating plant in a plant house near the new high school building and the removal of the old furnace in the Central building. When the work is completed there will be no fire in either building but the heating will come from the plant house nearby.

## LOOKOUT PUT ON MT. EMILY

LOWELL WILLIAMSON OF THIS CITY IS EAGLE EYE.

All Sections of Vast Area Can Be Scanned From Point.

Complete scrutiny of a vast area of timberland from the peak of Mt. Emily is now going on as a preventative to forest fires. As a sequence of a trip made to Mt. Emily by J. T. Williamson recently the Union and Walla Walla Forest Fire association has put Lowell Williamson on scout duty on Mt. Emily and from that point with a field glass he will daily scan the horizon for signs of forest fires. Within a few days a telephone will be built to the scout headquarters so that the lookout can call any section of the area which he can view from that point and notify authorities when fires are discovered. The whole plan is admitted to be the best there is anywhere in the state for the mountain gives him a very good view of an immense territory in Union, Walla Walla and Baker counties with all up-river districts clearly discernable on a bright day. Mr. Williamson will also ride the territory back of the point and post notices but daily there will take place the careful scanning of the two counties and more.

## RYE VALLEY FAMILY SLAIN

MURDER AND SUICIDE OCCURS YESTERDAY.

Two Dead and Another Dying as Result of Shooting.

Baker, Aug. 15.—Mrs. George Cartwright, aged 22, and Lawrence Cartwright, her brother-in-law, aged 39 are dead and David Powell, aged 21, a nephew of the latter, is probably fatally injured as the result of a shooting affray at the home of George Cartwright on what is known as the Brown ranch at Rye valley yesterday morning. The shooting was done by Lawrence Cartwright, who after killing his sister-in-law and wounding his nephew with a 38 calibre revolver, turned the gun on himself and ended his own life.

The tragedy took place between 1:30 and 11 o'clock. The murderer rode his horse from his own home to that of his brother, where, according to the story of neighbors, the several families involved were preparing to go on a trip after huckleberries. What preceded the shooting is not known, for those present, if they know, have said nothing, and it is likely that the real cause will never be known. Cartwright had not been there long before he pulled his gun and fired two shots at his brother's wife as she stood in the yard. Both took effect, one going through her head and the other through her body.

When the shooting started Powell who was present, jumped on his horse and started away. Cartwright began firing at him and several shots took effect. Powell, however, succeeded in getting to the Richard Cartwright ranch, about half a mile away, where he is now in a precarious condition. After shooting the two, Lawrence Cartwright started from the house to the road, and on reaching the highway put the revolver to his head and sent a bullet crashing through his brain.

Word of the tragedy was received here about noon, Sheriff Rand, Coroner West and District Attorney Godwin all leaving for the scene at once.

On arriving at Durkee and learning more details, the officers decided that it would not be necessary to go to the expense of holding an inquest and returned to Baker without making the trip to Rye valley.

Lawrence Cartwright is survived by a widow and three children, Mrs. George Cartwright by her husband and one child, and David Powell, the injured man, was married only last fall.

The prevailing opinion among the neighbors and members of the family is that Cartwright was temporarily insane and committed his rash deeds while not in his right mind.

### Aged Murderer Feeble.

Baker, Aug. 15.—With his victim dead and himself in very feeble health, partly as the result of the great nervous strain following the tragedy, Frank B. Alexander, the slayer of William Anderson, was yesterday afternoon removed from the county jail to the St. Elizabeth hospital for treatment. He does not know that Anderson is dead, the officials not deeming it wise in his present condition to inform him. At the hospital last evening it was stated that while Alexander is in a critical condition, it is hoped that he will recover.

William Anderson, shot last Sunday evening by Alexander at the latter's home at Halfway, died Wednesday evening, word of his death reaching here yesterday noon. Efforts to communicate by phone to Halfway yesterday were unavailing, the line being out of order. The news of Anderson's death came by telegraph via Robinett.

According to information received by the authorities from Halfway, it is said that the shooting took place after an attack had been made on Alexander and his wife by Anderson at the latter's home and that the fatal shot was fired in self defense, but this could not be verified.
