FREDDY WELSH IS CONFIDENT

LARGELY PLANNING TOUR AFTER CHAMPION FIGHT.

Vancouver Battle on Labor Day to Decide Supremacy.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 18.—So sure is Freddy Welsh that he will repeat his former victory over world's Champion Willie Ritchie, when the pair meet in this city for their twenty round championship battle on Labor Day afternoon that he is already going ahead with his plans for future matches based on a decision over the San Francisco champion.

"I want the general public to know that if I win this title I am going to defend it every time a worthy opponent comes into view," declared Welsh. "First of all Packy McFarland can have his chance. I have already boxed him 55 rounds, being the only lightweight that has ever dared tackle McFarland. I can easily make the 133 ringside, the American scale of weight, but if McFarland can do 135 at 6:00 o'clock, he can have the first chance at the title. Then, on every holiday I am ready to defend the title before the club offering the highest price, and allow the general public to select my opponent."

"I will realize that there has been no really popular lightweight champion since the days of Battling Nelson. I want to be as popular as Bat was, and the only way to gain that popularity is to keep boxing and defending the title."

Harry Pollock, manager of Welsh, is just as certain that his charge will be the next champion, and along this line is mapping out the campaign. Immediately after the battle, in the event of Welsh winning, Pollock and Welsh will start for England and Wales, taking a moving film of the bout with them. They will exhibit in the British isles, and then return to New York, where Pollock has practically accepted an offer for a Thanksgiving day match with McFarland, provided the latter shows any inclination to make 135 pounds at 6 o'clock. Welsh's next bout will be Christmas day, on the coast, and every holiday until he retires or is defeated, will see the Briton in the ring against the best of his opponents.
