WHITING HORSE DEAL COMES TO COURT.

Burnett and Goetting Are Charged With Disposing of Mare.

An art-chaux to what has long been a matter for the sheriff's office in this county, came this morning when C. E. Burnett and Wm. Goetting pleaded not guilty to a grand jury indictment charging them with selling a horse that belonged to E. W. Whiting of Mt. Glenn. The alleged act was committed some time ago and the horse was found in Los Angeles shortly after it disappeared, and there Sheriff Hug replevined it for Mr. Whiting. The horse was sold in Los Angeles under authority however having been taken there first by a horse buyer. The charge is that the two men disposed of the animal and that a horse buyer took it to California along with some other Grande Ronde horses. The two men were arrested in Boise and Vale a few days ago and arraigned yesterday afternoon and today pleaded not guilty.

Finley Has Friends.

San Francisco, Aug. 19.—Indignant that a man who shed no blood is sentenced to die on the scaffold, anti-capital punishment societies throughout California today put into motion a big public sentiment campaign to save James W. Finley from the Gallows. Finley was sentenced to death under a California law which provides that extreme penalty for a penitentiary inmate who attempts to escape. The date of Finley's hanging is set for October 24.

The law under which Finley was sentenced was passed to enable the state to hang Jacob Oppenheimer, the "Tiger of Folsom prison," who after a long legal fight, finally was hanged on July 18. Three men took part in the attempted prison break in 1905 for which Finley was sentenced to die. They were Finley, Manuel Quijada and Charles Carson. Quijada was killed by Oppenheimer who broke from his guards one day and stabbed Quijada with a knife he had made with a knitting needle. Carson today is in the state asylum at Stockton, believed to be incurably insane. He has not spoken a word for more than two years. At the time of the break, Finley attacked no one. He dashed past Guard Murphy brandishing a knife.
