STODDARD ON WAY TO SOUTH

PERRY LUMBERMAN LEAVES WITH REGRET.

Will Operate Saw Mill in Quincy—He Went Through the Ranks.

Perry, Aug. 19.—(Special)—Will Y. Stoddard, secretary and treasurer of the Grande Ronde Lumber company, left here last night for Salt Lake from which point he will proceed to Quincy, California, after getting his family located in Salt Lake City for the winter.

As already noted in these columns, Mr. Stoddard has accepted the management of large lumbering interests controlled by F. S. Murphy and other Salt Lake people and intends to begin erection of a saw mill and a planing mill on their property at once. Mr. Murphy was once located at Perry. Mr. Stoddard has been employed

here at Perry for the past ten years where he started as water carrier. By diligence and application to his duties, he rose step by step, passing through and becoming familiar with every department of the lumber business and in 1904 Mr. Stoddard became superintendent of the entire plant which position of trust and responsibility he has filled since.

As Mr. Stoddard was bidding his friends good bye yesterday morning before leaving, a tear was seen trickling down his cheek. He disliked to leave after making this his home for so long. Taking a last look at his old home and the plant, Mr. Stoddard left. Mr. Stoddard and family leave with the good wishes and esteem of all the people both of Perry and La Grande, where he will be greatly missed.

For the present George Stoddard will give his entire attention to the Perry mill and there will probably be no superintendent named for the present.

EASTERNER COMING WEST

LOCAL PRODUCE HOUSE CHANGES HANDS TODAY.

R. C. Snook of Williston, N. D., to Enter Local Field Soon.

D. M. Clark has sold his interest in the Clark-Snook Produce company and R. C. Snook a brother of W. S. Snook, who was the junior member of the present firm, comes from Williston, North Dakota, to take over the interests held by Mr. Clark. The company was formed about a year ago. The North Dakota investor was here some time ago looking over the city with a view of locating and has decided to come west at once. The new firm is to be known as Snook Brothers, and R. C. Snook will arrive with his family in October to take active interest in the firm and to become a permanent resident of La Grande.

Mr. Clark will probably give his principal time hereafter to the Oregon Packing company of which he has been local representative for some time.

NEW ORDERS PLEASE WELL

ISOLATED TRACT RULING RELEASES FUNDS.

About Seven Thousand at Present Is Held Under Old Requirements.

Between \$6,000 and \$7,000 of money held in reserve here for months and some times for a year or more, will be put back into circulation from the United States land office in accordance with an order issued recently by the general land office. The order refers to the old-time depot site required of applicants for the purchase of isolated tracts. These moneys represent usually, the earnings of stockmen and others who have good need for their money but have been required to leave their surplus coin lying idle for months while purchasing isolated tracts. Register Bramwell and Receiver Skiff have been advised of the new ruling.

The regulations have been amended "so that hereafter the deposit of \$1.25 an acre will not be required. The money which has already been deposited will be returned to the register's official check, unless the sale has been ordered by the general land office."

The deposit requirement was a particularly burdensome rule. It deprived applicants of the use of their money, centering it in land office towns.

The general land office would take weeks and months in passing on applications. So while the red tape was being unwound the one certain thing for the would-be buyer was that he was out of the use of his money, without the slightest assurance he would get the land.

Another regulation at which prospective purchasers have chafed puts the man who makes application for an isolated tract at a disadvantage. By this regulation no application will be accepted from a person who has purchased any isolated tract lands which when added to the area applied for exceeds 160 acres. But at the sale, any person can bid for and get the land, without regard for how much isolated land he may have bought previously.

BUMGARNER HEARING FRIDAY.
Alleged Poisoning Charge to Be Heard in Court This Week.

Baker, Aug. 19.—The preliminary hearing of J. R. Bumgarner, recently arrested in connection with the attempted poisoning of his entire family at South Baker several weeks ago, will be held next Friday before Justice of the Peace F. L. Hubbard. The hearing was to have been held last week but was postponed to allow the prisoner time to employ counsel.

Bumgarner at the time of the postponement protested against his hearing being held before Judge Hubbard on the grounds that before appointment as justice he had been counsel for Mrs. Bumgarner in her successful suit for divorce against her husband. There is no portion of the statute covering a change of venue in justice court, only a change in the trial courts being provided for. The justice court does not pass sentence and there is no authority higher than the justice to order such a change as desired by Bumgarner, even were it permissible under the statute. Therefore, the hearing will be held before

Justice Hubbard, Bumgarner's wishes to the contrary notwithstanding.
