Hoke Smith After Weinstock.

Washington, Aug. 20.—Col. Harris Weinstock of Sacramento, will not be confided as a member of the national industrial commission right off, if Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia, can prevent it. And Smith is chairman of the senate committee which has in charge the report on the nominations in this case.

Smith wants a farmer named on the industrial commission. The fact that President Wilson has filled the list, and there's no place for a farmer, without crowding off someone already there, cuts no figure with the senator from Georgia, whereat Senator Hughes of New Jersey, is far from pleased. Hughes is the only trade union senator, and he wants this commission to get to work on the problem of prevention of strikes.

Smith's reason for insisting on a farmer is said to be the fact that his chief political enemy, Joe Brown, wants to beat him for the senatorial honor next time. Brown is strong with the Farmers' union in the south. Smith is trying to checkmate him. The industrial situation meanwhile will have to take care of itself.
