

### State News Brevities

#### Smashes Cars; Saves Boy.

Pendleton, Aug. 19.—To save a little 10-year-old boy from injury or death under the wheels of his auto, Dr. J. A. Best yesterday afternoon deliberately ran his car into the curbing of the street and as a result, the force of the impact with the concrete curb being sufficient to bend an axle and crack a few spokes in one of the wheels.

The accident occurred about 4:00 o'clock on Alta street just at the rear of the Episcopal church. The doctor was proceeding up the street to the hospital and estimates the speed at which he was traveling at about 12 miles an hour. As he approached the Thacker store, the small boys ran out of the door onto the street directly in front of his car. He threw on the emergency brake but to avoid hitting the smallest of the trio, was compelled to turn his car into the curbing. He states that the little fellow seemed to have become "locoed" and, even after the car had collided with the curbing and had come to a full stop, ran squarely into it.

#### Third Alfalfa Crop Cut.

Stanfield, Ore., Aug. 19.—The cutting of the third crop of alfalfa began at Stanfield Saturday and within the next month thousands of tons of fine hay will have been placed in the stack. The rains of the last few days have been a great benefit to the growing grass and have placed the ground in excellent shape for the production of the fourth crop. Climate conditions have been favorable this year and most of the ranchers have put up their hay without having it wet, although some who were late suffered from the rains.

The hay this year is of excellent quality and the heavy yield assures an abundant supply for all feeding purposes. The average yield this year has been eight and nine tons per acre. With the increased acreage more beef and dairy cattle are being imported, and thousands of head will be fed here this winter.

#### Billy Sunday at The Dalles.

The Dalles, Aug. 20.—"Billy" Sunday, the noted baseball-evangelist talked to one of the largest crowds that ever jammed inside the Vogt theatre yesterday afternoon.

Sunday raced back and forth across

the large stage as though he were stealing bases in the days when he was a star member of the old Chicago White Sox. His address was something besides a bitter tirade against the saloon; it was an entertainment for the large audience found the characteristic Sunday vernacular and antics were amusing.

The evangelist preached at the M. E. church to a full congregation yesterday morning. He and his family were entertained at the F. C. Sexton home during their stay here Sunday.

#### Burley May Save Mine.

Salem, Ore., Aug. 20.—James Crawford, assistant attorney general, has gone to Grants Pass, at the instance of Corporation Commissioner Watson, to ask Circuit Judge Calkins to appoint Thomas S. Burley receiver of the Alameda Consolidated Mines company.

Mr. Burley, who has stock in the company, is one of the wealthiest residents of Tacoma. He has promised Commissioner Watson that he will put sufficient money into the mining company to demonstrate that it is a paying proposition.

#### Suspected Thief Arrested.

Baker, Aug. 19.—A party giving the name of Charles Smith was arrested late yesterday afternoon by Officer Brennan on suspicion that he is the man who stole a suit of clothes from the O. W. R. & N. depot yesterday afternoon. The package containing the clothes was left on one of the seats by a passenger waiting for a train, when some one made away with them.

The man was seen going with the package and the officer had a good description, which "Smith" answered perfectly. The latter denied the charge and the goods were not found on him. The officers last evening had not located the stolen goods.

#### Bridge Bids Opened.

Baker, Aug. 19.—Bids were opened this afternoon at the city commissioners' meeting for the construction of a new steel bridge and concrete abutment over Powder river on Bridge street. Eight bidders submitted figures, with a wide variance of prices for the work.

George A. Sears entered a formal protest against the bid of A. C. U. Berry of Portland, alleging it was not in form. At the close of the reading

of the bids Mr. Sears stated to the city commissioners that he would protest any bid accepted by them should it not be in form.

#### Bandon Woman Dies in Bath Tub.

Bandon, Ore., Aug. 19.—Mrs. Maude Gertrude Smith, wife of E. N. Smith, a well known realty dealer here, was found dead in a bathroom at the hotel Gallier. Mrs. Smith went to the bathroom about 11 o'clock Saturday morning, but was not missed until about 1 o'clock, when her children asked for their mother to take them in the dining room. Mrs. Smith has suffered from heart trouble, and her death is attributed to that, although she has been feeling well for several weeks.

#### Reform School Ages Limited.

Boys between the ages of 16 and 18 will not be received at the state reform school henceforth. The state board of control has ordered the return to the sheriff of Washington county of Orin LaCourse and Dan Ward, each 17 years of age. Sixteen-year-old boys may go to the reform school and those of 18 to the penitentiary, but there is a problem relating to those between these ages.

#### Hooked by a Cow.

Pendleton, Aug. 19.—A Japanese boy, who has been working on the W. J. Furnish summer place near Bingham springs, was hooked through the arm by a cow yesterday morning and was brought to Pendleton for medical attention. He was milking the cow when she turned and ran her long horn through the fleshy part of his arm, inflicting a painful but not serious wound.

#### Reid Is Released.

Pendleton, Aug. 19.—Bill Reid, former Yakima outfielder, who has been playing the past few weeks with the Pendleton team, has been released. His inability to hit the ball consistently impaired his value to the local bunch and, after giving him every opportunity to prove his worth, Manager Al. Laddell issued the blue slip for the sake of cutting down expenses.
