without letting all get a chance to bid as the bond feature might force the Geiger company to raise their bid

over what other companies would bid and, therefore, not be low man. The back-up-and-do-it-again feature was again discussed. Sargent moved to adopt the concrete bid without bond requirements, and Councilman Haisten seconded and opposed the bond feature as unnecessary but in the meantime Mayor Hall had

held out for the bond if one could be obtained at the same bid as was presented. The inefficiency of the present bond, if such there were, had nothing to do with the council protecting the property owners with a better bond if such could be obtained. In the end, however, the mayor's idea didn't prevail as the bond issue was dropped entirely.

Property Owners Talk.

Mr. Pattison again spoke saying he supposed there was a bond feature when he circulated the petition.

Jack Childs talked on the bond issue saying bonds usually were not of much value. Wear and tear must be accounted for. It had been previously pointed out that the Warren bond provided only for inferior workmanship and material and had nothing to do with the general deterioration from the elements.

Mr. West pointed out that it was foolish to insist on a guarantee if such a guarantee could not be enforced. He said that it was to be supposed the bid would be increased if a bond was required, and supposed the bond was to be required.

Councilman Lincoln argued for the bond saying he would not vote for the paving if a bond, the same or better than those covering work in the past, was not required. He and councilman Jones voted against the resolution on that ground.

The unfairness to the other bidders was again brought up and then came the final vote on the passage of the motion after a motion to amend by substituting a five year bond clause by Campbell had died, and the vote stood six-two—Lincoln and Jones opposing, and Campbell, Davis, Haisten, Fitzgerald, Sargent and Wright favoring.

This was pass the resolution giving the contract to the Geiger people without bond other than the 10 per cent hold-out for six months.

The property owners left immediately a majority of them highly pleased that a new paving company had entered the field. "The King is dead; long live the king," was their expression at the outcome.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., Aug. 21.—The appointment of H. T. French as state agricultural leader, to have direct charge of farm demonstration and supervise the work of the county agriculturists, has been announced by R. D. Hetzel, director of the extension division. In referring to the new leader Professor Hetzel said: "The college is giving the farmers of Oregon as their chief adviser a man who for 12 years, was closely identified with the agricultural development of Oregon and thoroughly understands agricultural conditions in every part of the state. His appointment is an important step in the development of the extension service."
