HEAR OBJECTIONS MONDAY.

Circuit Judge to Hear Complaints From Water Users That Date.

Monday morning Circuit Judge Knowles will receive any objections that may be pending against the findings of the state water board in the adjudication of water rights in North Powder river. These findings were obtained at the state water board's office upon the testimony taken and applications filed by residents and water users before Water Superintendent Cochran some time ago, on the same plan that applications for water rights are now going on with Grande Ronde valley streams. These findings, reached by the entire board, have now been filed with the county clerks of Union and Baker counties, and the adjudications will come in for criticism next Monday morning. Unless objections are made, the findings become a court order at the instigation of the circuit judge and if objections are made it becomes the duty of the court to readjust the matter. It is said there are only a few minor objections pending.
