After "Fire Speeders."

"Hereafter anyone violating the speed ordinances while on their way to fires will be prosecuted. The state law does not give license to volunteer fire members to endanger the lives of pedestrians by rushing at break-neck speed in autos to fires. The city's auto car will have the right of way and will not be held to speed limits but other cars will. When the fire car passes a given point, people rush over crossings and on the street and not expecting other cars to pass at high rates of speed, are constantly in great danger. This has been the practice every time there is a fire and I am going to cause the arrest and prosecute the next person who violates this law. I hope to have it stopped before someone is killed. Two men very narrowly escaped death Saturday night because a volunteer fireman drove a machine at top speed through a crowd of people."
