BETTER FRUIT TRADE POSSIBLE

SPECIAL FRUIT TRAINS TO ACCOMMODATE COAST.

Frisco and Northwest Shipments to the East Every Week.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(Special)—Pacific northwest fruit will hereafter get the best service that the railroad and refrigerator car companies can give.

Announcement to that effect was made today to officials of the Northwestern Fruit exchange of this city by J. W. McClymonds, general agent of the Pacific Fruit express with headquarters at San Francisco.

According to the news given out by Mr. McClymonds, Oregon-Washington-Idaho fruit shipments destined for the east will hereafter reach its destination in much quicker time. From Granger, Idaho, to Council Bluffs, Ia., the shipments will be handled each week on the special trains that will likewise carry all of the California fruits. The service will alternate between the Chicago and North-Western and the Illinois Central, each road running a special train every other week.

The announcement is perhaps the most important ever given out by the shipping interests of this section. For years the fruit industry here has been held back to a very considerable degree by the failure of the transportation companies to provide adequate transportation facilities for eastern shipments.

The present announcement means a vast improvement in the service and it is anticipated that still greater reforms will be shown after while. Just at present peach growers will receive most of the benefits of the change. There are indications of a very good market for Pacific northwest peaches at eastern centers within a short period. While the present demand is limited, the outlook is far more hopeful than any of the shipping interests had anticipated a short time ago.

Even on the basis of present prices for Colorado peaches in the Eastern markets, it would be profitable to ship Oregon-Washington-Idaho stock in that direction.

Watermelon Supply Is Thinning Out and Scarcity Is Near.

Many foodstuffs have dropped in price the past day or two. Today there is a lower figure on celery, fresh tomatoes are down to \$1.00 per box, cabbage sells for 2 cents, peaches run from 75 cents to \$1.25, watermelons are a half cent cheaper but scarce at that figure, grapes are cheaper.
