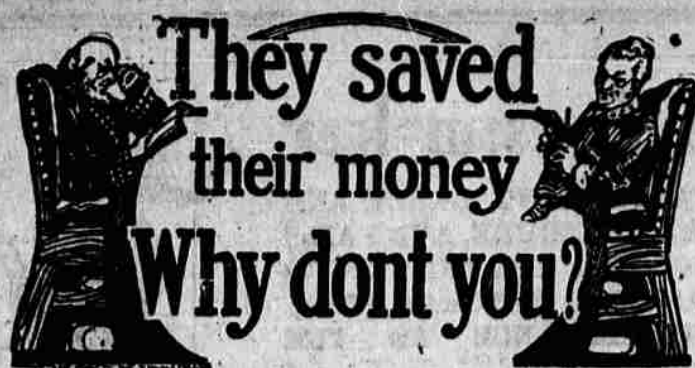

MARKETS LOCAL AND STATE

HALF-FATTED STOCK DRAGS

PAST WEEK IS MARKED WITH
DRAGGING EFFECT.

Excellent Quality of Beef and Hogs
Alone Bring Top Prices.

LOCAL HOGS SHIPPED.

Robert Stanfield on Saturday
shipped 11 cars of stock from
Hilgard and Meacham. Today
he ships 15 carloads from Wal-
lowa and on September 5th
he ships 10 cars from Union,
making a total of 36 cars of stock
to leave La Grande yards within
a week's time. All the cars go
direct to Chicago.

Portland Union Stock Yards Co.,
North Portland, Ore., Sept. 1.—(Spe-
cial)—Receipts for the week have
been, Cattle 2046; calves, 91; hogs,
820; sheep, 4096; and horses, 1.

The cattle market has suffered de-
cline since last Saturday and while
not severe, it amounted to a quarter.
Buyers could not be induced to bid
over \$8.00 for any quantity of choice
steers. A few picked from the lot
sold at higher prices but the bulk
was a \$7.50 to \$7.75 affair. Half fat
and poorly finished beef is a drag on
the market, unless of feeder quality.
Desirable feeders are selling freely
\$6.00 to \$6.50. Butcher stock has
been uneven and prices ranged wide.
Good cows at \$7.00 and steers at
\$8.00. Bulls at \$5.00 and calves at
\$9.00 are liberal quotations in the cat-
tle market.

A difficult hog market to judge.
One shore car sold Thursday for \$9.60
and one car of contracted stuff came
into the yards Friday, but these were
the only two at the unloading chutes
on these days. Monday's top sales
were \$9.30 and one load Tuesday "off
cars" at \$9.70. What the market
would do in the event a reasonable
liquidation occurred and buyers had a
respectable hog spread is hard to
conjecture. Monday had the only re-
ceipts of the week and the total was
extremely light. On the basis of ma-
jority of swine transactions the prices
seem strong at \$9.00 and \$9.50 and de-
mand firm.

Mutton and lamb buyers furnished
an interesting feature to the
draggish livestock market.
At \$4.25 ewes at \$3.85
and lambs at \$5.25 created
active trade. Killers are not

SMUGGLING SCANDAL FOUND.

Eight Men Removed From Service at
San Francisco Under Clouds.

San Francisco, Aug. 30.—The war-
rants for the arrests of 11 customs
guards, to be suspended from service,
is the first step in what promises to
develop the biggest smuggling scan-
dal ever brought to light on the Pa-
cific Coast. The details of the opera-
tions, of the ring which it is al-
leged has been in operation on the
Pacific coast in connivance with these
customs guards, are in the hands of
the Collector of Port Davis. The con-
fessions are declared by Davis to be
ample proof for the conviction of those
accused. Davis declares that the
China, operates on the Pacific coast
opium ring with representatives in
ports and is engaged in illicit trad-
ing, for profit amounting to hundreds
of thousands of dollars. It was the
practice, asserts Davis, for the guards
to carry the drug ashore and deliver it
to agents in the smuggling ring.
