**J. F. CAMPBELL WINS CONTRACT
FOR BRIDGES.**

Construction of Union Bridge to Be
gin Tomorrow.

Construction of the new steel
bridge over Catherine creek in the
heart of Union is to be commenced to-
morrow. J. F. Campbell was the low-
est bidder for the job at Union and
was also awarded the bridge at Palmer
mill as the lowest bidder. Both
structures will cost about \$1550 each
to Mr. Campbell, and the exact cost
will be known when it is determined
how much cement will be needed in
both bridges. The local bridge will
not be built immediately, the present
structure being slated for removal
first.

Yesterday Regularly Observed.

Commencing with a love feast pre-
sided over by the Dr. Van Dusen,
many years ago a pastor in this vi-
cinity, yesterday was a busy day for
visiting delegations and for local
church goers. At 11 o'clock Bishop
Nathalia Luccock, D. D., preached
to a large audience in the high school
auditorium, using the old school style
of a sermon. The reason why the
Helena divine is a bishop, cropped out
readily enough; he preaches biblical
doctrine in the good old fashioned
Methodist way. Mrs. A. L. Richard-
son of La Grande and Mrs. Edith
Wright Phy of Union, sang excellent
solos, Mrs. W. W. Berry of this city
and Mrs. Ina Wright Herbst presiding
at the piano. The Methodist choir sang
an anthem adding to the musical fea-
tures of the number. This was the
principal address by the presiding
bishop and was intensely interesting
to ministers, laymen and non-church
men.

In the afternoon at 2:30 ordination
services were conducted.

At 4 o'clock in the afternoon me-
morial services were held for mem-
bers of the conference who have died
during the past year, or for members
of the pastors' families.

Last evening the closing numbers
drew a large audience to the high
school auditorium again. Dr. Skip-
worth of the Sunday school board,

spoke interestingly and was followed
by Dr. Martin of the Freedman's Aid
and Southern Extension society. As
the climax to an exceptionally inter-
esting week, came the reading of the
assignments, the last official word
spoken by the 30th annual conference.
During the closing hours, the follow-
ing resolutions loudly praising Dr. E.
B. Fyke, who has shouldered the man-
agement of the conference, the Com-
mercial club, the Observer and many
others for the various parts played in
the conclave:
