## A New Fish Story.

Wallowa, Sept. 1.—W. E. Leffel, deputy state game warden, with his headquarters at Joseph, was in Wallowa Monday and told a fish story that sounds good to the amateurs, and gives experienced fishermen a fishy taste in their mouth. Mr. Leffel says that he and Ike Flannery of Joseph, caught 100 bull trout measuring from 9 to 18 inches in length, the entire catch having been made on August 18th, in the south fork of the Imnaha river, above the box canyon. Then after getting away with this one, Mr. Leffel comes right back with another, namely: that he and his companion caught 83 rainbow trout at Cloverdale crossing on the Imnaha river, on August 18th, the fish measuring from 7 to 21 inches in length. But the remarkable part of this last story is that the entire catch was made in just three hours, 20 minutes and 10 seconds, and that grasshoppers were the bait used.

## Takes Over Warehouse.

A deal was made the past few days by which the Elgin Forwarding Co., has leased from the Wallowa Mercantile company the flouring mill and warehouse. It is the intention of the Forwarding company to continue the same kind of business the Wallowa Mercantile company has handled in the past with several new features. The flour mill has been sub-let to Barkham & Son, who have been running the company's mill at Joseph and who have the name of being first class millers. Lee Bell, who has had charge of the Elgin Forwarding company's business for the past year, will continue to be manager. An office will be opened in the old W. M. company warehouse.

## Ashland Hall Nearly Ready.

Ashland, Ore., Sept. 1.—Work is now under way on the rebuilding of the city hall and the construction of an addition to house the electric fire truck recently purchased. The improvements will cost between \$5,000 and \$6,000. It is expected to have them completed in about two months. The city is also constructing a concrete bridge across Ashland creek. This is said to be the sixteenth bridge built by the city across the creek at various points.

Ashland is manifesting considerable interest in the matter of bonding Jackson county for \$500,000 for a link in the Pacific highway through this county. The bond election will be held September 9.

Ashland, Ore., Sept. 1.—A very interesting and unique family reunion was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Zenas Howard on Neil creek today. Mr. and Mrs. Howard came to Jackson county in 1861 and have been residents of the same neighborhood ever since. For the first time in 30 years all their seven living children were with them. The day was spent in visiting, a bountiful dinner being served. There were nearly 20 in the party, including grandchildren. The following were the children present: Jeff Howard of Neil creek, Harvey Howard and George Howard of Hill, Cal.; Charles Howard of Prescott, Ariz.; Mrs. M. Parker of Holtville, Cal.; Mrs. S. A. Parker of Ashland and Walter Howard of Ashland. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Zenas Howard, have been wedded 59 years and hope to celebrate their 60 years of married life at least.

## a Pint Is Fatal Feed.

Salem, Ore., Sept. 1.—Stating that had not a crew of United States geographical surveyors sojourned at his place last year, two Jersey cows which died from drinking a pail of paint belonging to the crew, would still be living. I. K. Tooley of Albany has asked Secretary of State Olcott to take steps to have the state pay him for his loss.

Tooley gave the pail of paint to the surveyors when they arrived at his place, he says, and when they departed they left it suspended on a nail in the barn. Feeling sure that they would return for it, he left it there, and one day his two cows removed it from the nail and drank its contents with fatal effect.

He and his two sons, James and Hugh, have just returned from Chickahominy mountain, where they killed four deer, the minister killing one of them. They saw 14 deer in the mountains while gone.
