Prosecute "House" owners.

Pendleton, Sept. 3.—News has reached Pendleton from Salem to the effect that Ernest Ringo, special prosecutor for Governor West, in his vice crusade, intends instituting suit under the abatement law passed by the last legislature against the owners of houses recently raided by Detective Tom Kay and his men in this city. Under this law, a house whose reputation for ill fame has been established, may be closed for a year, but may be reopened for legitimate purposes again by the owner giving a bond, satisfactory to the court, that it will not again be used for immoral purposes.

In the recent raid, arrests were made in four rooming houses, the Columbia, the State, the Palace and the Umatilla, as well as in one or two private houses. In addition the proprietor of the Empire lodging house was recently convicted in police court for conducting a bawdy house. The announcement of the intention of the governor's special prosecutor has alarmed some of the people lest such action would seriously interfere with the accommodating of the Round-up crowd. However, it is doubtful whether such suits would be instituted until after the trials of the women arrested, inasmuch as the establishment of the character of the houses hinges on the outcome of these trials. These trials will probably not be heard until after next week on account of the circuit court being in session.

Mulhall Committee Adjourns.

Washington, Sept. 3.—Chairman Overman of the senate committee finished his probe into the activities of the manufacturers, as a result of the Mulhall charges. The committee has adjourned indefinitely. There will be no further sessions until the tariff bill is disposed of.
