SHORT COURSE TERM HERE ON MONDAY AND TUESDAY TO BE INSTRUCTIVE AND INTERESTING

The general welfare school—one of the extension schools which Oregon Agricultural college has maintained this summer—will hold a two days' session in La Grande, September 8-9, next Monday and Tuesday.

The meetings are to be held at the Commercial club and the programs will be made out and announced within the next few days.

Lectures, demonstrations, class work and interesting exhibits in charge of members of the O. A. C. faculty and representatives of the state dairy and food commission and the Oregon social hygiene society comprise the work. Every member of the staff is a specialist in his line and spares no pains to make the instruction of practical value to every man and woman, boy and girl, regardless of previous educational advantages or training.

Afternoon and evening lectures and classes will be conducted, treating such phases of domestic science and art, social hygiene, civic improvement, home decoration, sanitation, food adulteration and landscape gardening as touch most vitally the problems of every day life. The exhibits will be open for inspection during both days of the session.

The work in landscape gardening will be in charge of Professor A. L. Peck, former landscape gardener for the city of Boise, now a member of the O. A. C. faculty. Professor Peck has two very attractive illustrated lectures which are given in connection with his discussion of the problems of civic improvement: One is entitled, "The Improvement of City Streets and Parks," in which he tells what trees are best adapted for ornamental and shade in the respective communities visited, using lantern slides to illustrate what can be accomplished along these lines. His talk on "Landscape Gardening for City Residence Grounds and Suburban Homes" is an inspiration to every renter as well as home owner. Views of parks, streets and home grounds taken in various parts of the United States, will be shown.

Another feature of the work which is creating a great amount of interest, and resulting in much practical good, is the domestic science and art demonstrations conducted by Mrs. Lullie Robbins, extension professor of home economics. Not only are demonstrations made before the public but actual class work is also carried on, thus affording the women of the community an opportunity of trying out the methods presented.

Professor Tartar, department of chemistry, tests a few foods and medicines purchased in the cities visited and makes known the impurities that are found.

Secretary E. J. Cummins, of the Social Hygiene society, gives a series of four lectures, one for parents, one for business men, one for young men and one for boys 15 to 18 years of age. The Social Hygiene exhibit, which was a feature of the World's Christian Citizenship conference in Portland, is carried with the school.

Another exhibit is that prepared by the State Library association and showing how this institution is made accessible to the people of the state. It consists of a model traveling library including lists of books for home reading and study courses.

Mr. J. D. Mickle, state food and dairy commissioner, carries an exhibit of food stuffs and adulterants which is used to supplement his lectures relating to the campaign of food inspection which he and his deputies are conducting throughout the state.

In "carrying the college to the people" two so-called movable schools are being conducted by the extension division of O. A. C. during the summer months. Approximately fifty towns will have been visited when the work comes to a close on September 20. Some 20 members of the faculty, working in relays, have assisted with the instruction. The general welfare school which will visit La Grande, held the first session of its extended tour in Ashland on August 11 and is stopping only in the larger cities. The other school limits its instruction

to agriculture and home economics and is holding sessions in the smaller towns and rural centers. It will be at Imbler on September 8th.

Reports from southern Oregon are most favorable. At several of the sessions the halls were not large enough to accommodate the people, the domestic science and art work being especially well attended.

Due to recent appropriations made by the state legislature the scope of the extension work has been greatly broadened. Experts have been employed whose duty it is to spend their entire time aiding people throughout the state in working or better homes and farms. Mrs. Robbins is one of the most recent additions to the staff, and her work has proved extremely popular and of great practical value at all points where given.

"It is hoped that the citizens of the community will take advantage of the opportunity afforded by this meeting. The program promises to be most attractive and instructive and every man and woman should be interested in the subjects presented, especially home and civic improvement," said Commercial club Secretary Joe Williamson, today.

"Come prepared to take advantage of the helpful information which the college specialists will give; also present your problems of home and garden, thus aiding the lecturers to adapt their work to the peculiar needs of your own home and city."

BRANCH AT IMBLER.

Rural Sections to Get Benefit of Extension School Monday.

The first agricultural institute of the year will be held at Imbler next Monday, September 8th, when a staff of six specialists representing the extension division of Oregon Agricultural college will conduct lectures and demonstrations at the L. D. S. church. There will be an afternoon session beginning at 2 o'clock and an evening meeting at 7:30.

In the party will be Professor W. S. Brown, horticulturist; G. R. Hystop, agronomist; A. G. Tunn, poultry; Ava B. Milan and Mrs. Orla Buxton, domestic science and art, and Mr. M. S. Shrock, deputy state dairy and food commission. The local program is being arranged by Mr. M. L. M. Jensen of the Farmers' Union, who has announced the cooking demonstrations and women's meeting to begin at 2:00 o'clock.

This work is a part of the regular college extension service for which an appropriation was provided by the recent legislature and is meeting with unusual success in all parts of the state.

Every effort will be made by the instructors to adapt the work to the particular needs of Imbler and vicinity and to this end all interested are invited to bring up their special problems.
