Enterprise, Ore., Sept. 5.—(Special)—The library board met Tuesday evening for the regular session. It was the annual meeting for the election of officers. The expiration of the terms of two of the members of the board made it necessary to fill this vacancy. Two of the members serve for two years, two for four and two for six years. S. P. Saunders and Mrs. Carl Roe held the positions which expired the second of September. Mrs. Knapp and G. W. Hiatt the terms to expire at four years and Mrs. Browning and Dr. Hockett the six year-terms. The election of the officers was postponed until the next meeting. Bids were opened for the heating plant for the new building but a motion was made and carried to lay them on the table until the next meeting.
