Valuable timber of last year may return but such men as Snider, Rosenbaum and Geddes have not said the word that means certainty and there has been neither captain nor student manager during the summer so that it will depend entirely on what shows up next week to base forecasts on. There are several new men in sight, all of whom should make good additions to the squad.
