The Neighborhood club, Commercial club and local school authorities are all giving their unqualified endorsement to the general welfare work which the representatives of Oregon Agricultural college are promoting by means of the general welfare school which will visit La Grande next Monday and Tuesday. Every possible assistance is being rendered the staff in order that La Grande may profit as cities in other parts of the state have done by acting on the wholesome and practical information given along the lines of child welfare, pure foods, home and city improvement.

The object of the work is to carry helpful and usable information from the college to the people of the state with a view to impressing on every city dweller some of the numerous open channels by which he can aid in the nation wide campaign now waging for better cities, improved social conditions, right moral and physical development and efficient schools.

Mrs. F. S. Ivanhoe, county school superintendent, said: "Extension teaching has been universally recognized as the most efficient means at the command of educational institutions for increasing their usefulness to the general public. The results have proved to be extremely

practical, creating in the younger mind a thirst for useful knowledge and presenting to the mature mind concrete evidences of the value of keeping in touch with those who are directing the educational work of the higher institutions of learning."

No attempt is made by the staff in charge of the extension instruction to treat the technical phases of their subjects in an exhaustive manner. Movable school facilities are necessarily limited and emphasis is placed on methods which are practical in their application. For example, the demonstrations in domestic science and art will be emphasized simple accurate methods of obtaining attractive desired results.

In food preparation different proportions for making a white sauce will be given and its uses as the basis for creamed soups, escalloped dishes and croquettes explained.

Also proportions showing the development of a batter series from a thin batter to the thick dough. Other subjects such as cutting, fitting and sewing garments will be treated in a similar way.

Accompanying these demonstrations informal talks on lectures will be given in many problems concerning the home.

HUNTERS START FIRE.

La Grande Men Said to Have Caused Timber Fires.

Pendleton, Ore., Sept. 6.—The carelessness of some La Grande hunters started a fire in the timber and pastures near Hilgard which raged for three days and was only put out yesterday by the hardest kind of fighting by rangers and sheepmen combined. This was the news brought to the city this morning by A. W. Rugg, local woolgrower on whose range the fire occurred. As a result, he will hereafter bar all hunters from his 13,000 acre range which is one of the finest grouse haunts of the Blue mountains.

The fire did not burn any great amount of timber but it got into the knee high bunch grass and spread rapidly. Only by the hardest kind of fighting was the blaze confined to a 100 acre tract. This is the only fire that has been reported in the Blue mountains this summer.

Mr. Rugg states that he will post notices warning all the hunters from trespassing upon his range and that he will prosecute all offenders. Thus it behooves hunters to be careful in the future lest they shut themselves out of their favorite retreats.
