HOWARD CREEK ROAD RUSHED

GRADE OF SEVEN PER CENT ENCOUNTERED.

New Tract of Land Will Be Thrown Open to Entry Soon.

Wallowa, Ore., Sept. 12.—(Special)—The new logging road at Howard creek, which is being constructed by the George Palmer Lumber company, is rapidly nearing completion. About the miles of the new railroad have been completed, and a force of about 100 men is steadily advancing the work. Many difficulties of the first six miles in the construction of the road will be encountered. Fortunately however, the summit will be reached in the first six miles and thereafter the work will be pushed more rapidly. After the top has been reached the line will run fifteen miles into the Gessman country. The first three miles were built upon a little over a two per cent grade, the latter three miles to the top will reach nearly seven per cent. This grade is not considered very extraordinary for a logging road. At present the main camp for the road builders is at the junction of the O-W. R. & N. track, but next Monday this camp will be moved with all its portable houses, three miles up the track, when the men will be nearer their work.

The advisability of erecting a large warehouse where the logging road connects with the O-W. R. & N. is being considered. Should this be built it will be the base of supplies for the logging camps.

It is estimated that there is enough timber circumventing the new logging road to supply the mill in La Grande for the next quarter of a century. This new enterprise is entirely within Wallowa county.

Wallowa county will be well represented at the Pendleton Round-Up. Several horses left early in the week, in order that they might become acquainted with their new locations.

"Lew" Minor, the present world's champion, accompanied by his wife, left overland Sunday morning, driving two horses which they will use.

J. M. Blakely left Saturday with a large string of relay horses. These horses have been receiving some grueling training for the past several months and are expected to make an excellent showing.

Dr. R. A. McDonald, a recent arrival in Wallowa, has entered in the steer-roping contest. At a competition held at Cheyenne, the doctor won second prize. His friends here are looking for him to make a record at the Round-Up.

The Wallowa high school opened on Monday with the largest student body attendance of any high school in this county. 77 students were enrolled Monday, and today there are 85 bona fide students. The high school has accepted students from every part of the county, and also several from Union county, who reside in and around Elgin. The school has a reputation of maintaining a high standard, and undoubtedly this is responsible for the large attendance.

A manual training course, with J. C. Hall of Wallowa, instructor, has been added this year. The equipment for this new course has not yet arrived, owing to the fact that the school directors had not decided on the course until this week. However, as soon as its arrival, the new course will be started immediately.
