DEMURRER TO COMPLAINT IN

NORTH SECOND STREET UP IN COURT AGAIN.

City Attorney Demurs to Last Complaint on North Second.

Francis J. Crawford, John C. McEwen, Chas. Floberg, Oscar Thompson, Louis Strom, F. B. Ferguson and the La Grande Real Estate association the combination of men and corporations that have been carrying on the fight against North Second street and who have won and lost at least three times previously, have soon to argue a demurrer filed by City Attorney Rusk against the last attack on the street field by these people. The action was filed about a month ago shortly after Judge Knowles had ruled that the action brought earlier in the year was prematurely commenced. It requires a statistical clerk to keep track of the ups and downs of this particular street litigation, but a demurrer has been filed at any rate, to the last effort to block payment of assessments on the street which was macadamized several years ago and on which the city has been paying out large sums of interest money.

The present complaint is somewhat the same as others. It sets out that no ordinance was passed authorizing the council to enter into a contract with Contractor John Mars; and sets out that John Mars did not fulfill the "pretended" contract.

HORSES TO GO TO BAKER.

Sammy Mullin, Local Horse, Among Walla Walla String.

A carload of horses from Walla Walla, going to the Baker races this week, passed through the city today. T. L. Lawrence of Walla Walla is one of the men in attendance and had under his particular management the Hi Peach horse, Sammy Mullin, one of the best known gallopers in this section of the country. Sammy hasn't had a rider for some little time, but has one now and much is expected of him in the Baker turf events. There were eight animals in the carload, three gallopers, one trotter and three pacers, making up the shipment.

Bixby Trial Is On.
Los Angeles, Sept. 16.—After various delays the trial of the millionaire banker, Bixby, began today in the superior court, before Judge Bledsoe. He is being tried on charges of contributing to the delinquency of Marie Brown Levey and Cleo Helen Barker, minors.

ARCHITECTS DRAWING PLANS

Y. M. C. A. PLANS IN HANDS OF DESIGNERS.

Oldest Booster on Building Committee—Rushing Plans.

Milton S. Block of the firm of Block & Bunting, local architects, has been engaged to draw up detailed plans for the Y. M. C. A. building to be erected at the corner of Elm and Washington. Secretary Rudd in explaining the activities of the past few months said this morning: "Some people have thought that the building committee appointed some weeks ago, has been doing nothing. On the contrary, although little has been made public, this group of men have spent many hours of careful study, investigation and planning. A subscription to the building fund is a good thing; a subscription paid up is better, but when a man does both of these things and then gives his time beside, it seems to me a glorious gift. We owe much to these men, several associations have

been inspected in person by the committee and others have been studied through plans. The result of these careful investigations and study has been embodied in a rough plan of the building which the architect will use as the basis of his work."

One change has been made in the building, because of added duties following the fire at the Palmer mill. Mr. George Palmer felt that he must resign. His services were greatly appreciated during the time of his activities. Harry Grady, who for the past 20 years has been working for a Y. M. C. A. in La Grande, has been appointed to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Palmer's resignation.
