**Cottage Grove Fair Is Ready.**  
Cottage Grove, Or., Sept. 18.—The big grange fair opened today and there is every indication that it will be in keeping with this particular section of the fertile, fruitful Willamette, where everything grows on a large scale and is done on a big plan. Features of the exhibit will be the appearance of the Eugene Radiators, accompanied by large delegations from Eugene and Springfield, Friday forenoon. An informal good roads meeting will be held in the Commercial club rooms at 10:30 that morning.

**Fall Salmon Catch Light.**  
Astoria, Or., Sept. 18.—While the catch of fall salmon was fairly good at the opening of the season, it has been light during the past few days. The take last night ran from one fish up to 10 or 12 to the boat. Almost no silversides are being taken and none are looked for until after the rains begin.

**Perrine Again Sentenced.**  
Oregon City, Or., Sept. 18.—Sentenced twice in the circuit court of Clackamas county for the same robbery of the Milwaukee State Bank, Virgil Perrine, under the guard of Sheriff Mass, started on another trip to Salem and the Oregon Penitentiary this afternoon to begin sentence. When Perrine first was brought before Judge Campbell he was given a sentence in the penitentiary of from one to ten years. It has now been discovered, however, that the sentence for the crime of assault and robbery with a dangerous weapon is from ten years to life. The court this afternoon gave Perrine his second sentence—ten years flat.

**Loaded Auto Struck.**  
Salem, Or., Sept. 18.—Wayne Lewis and Frank Burns, two Portland men who were injured last night when an Oregon Electric car struck an automobile in which they were riding, are reported out of serious danger today. Lewis sustained an ugly scalp wound and Burns was bruised about the head. J. Kennedy and William Sayre and four women who were in the car escaped with slight scratches and bruises. The party were hop pickers at the Livesley yard. The rear of the machine was struck as it was crossing the Oregon Electric track at the Livesley place.

**Alpine Will Have Mill.**  
Eugene, Or., Sept. 18.—The Ox Bow Lumber Company, of Eugene, will begin at once to dismantle its mill on Coyote Creek, near Noti, west of Eugene, and remove it to Alpine, a few miles north of Monroe on the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway. The mill will cut 50,000 feet a day.

**Salem Woman Dead.**  
Salem, Or., Sept. 18.—After three weeks' illness from acute stomach trouble, Mrs. Margaret Macrum Byrd, wife of W. H. Byrd, died Monday, leaving besides her husband, two sons in Salem and four brothers living in Portland. She was 49 years old and one of the prominent society women of the city. She was a graduate of the New England conservatory of music. The funeral was held Wednesday from the residence.

**Pole Ordinance Postponed.**  
Hood River, Or., Sept. 18.—The proposed common user ordinance, providing for the joint use in this city of one set of poles on one side of the streets by power companies and telephone companies on the opposite side of the street, met with defeat in the city council last night. Action on the ordinance was deferred for several months, it having been reported that the State Railroad Commission would make a report on such construction of lines. This report not having been given out, the council decided to take definite action, with the result that the reconstruction will not be required of the local public utilities companies. Representatives were present at the council meeting from the Hydro-Electric Company, the Hood River Gas & Electric Company, the Oregon-Washington Telephone Company and the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company.

**Fish Ladder Big Problem.**  
Hood River, Or., Sept. 18.—D. F. McGee, chief engineer, and Guy W. Talbot, president of the Pacific Power & Light Company, have been here conferring with local sportsmen in efforts to reach some conclusion as to a change in the plans of the fish ladder that was recently ordered reconstructed over their dam on Hood river. The officials of the company declare that the construction as asked for on the west side of the river by the Commission will materially weaken their dam, and ask that they be allowed to put in a ladder of different design on the east side of the stream. The local sportsmen, whose voice in the matter the State Game and Fish Commission is allowing to control, assert that the designs as originally submitted to the power company, must be followed, since the form of ladder specified is the only one that will not obstruct the passage of salmon.

**Many Hunt Man's Body.**  
Hood River, Or., Sept. 18.—"We are going to scour the woods in an effort to find the body of W. H. Rodenhiser, and send up as many men as you can gather," was the message received here today by Marshal Carson from George W. Dimick, a resident of the Parkdale country, where Mr. Rodenhiser, a merchant and rancher, who mysteriously disappeared several weeks ago, has lived for the past 25 years. Mr. Carson will send up a posse tomorrow. Already nearly 100 upper valley residents, with food to last a number of days and camp equipment, have begun a systematic search.

**Slain Man Is Honored.**  
Astoria, Or., Sept. 18.—The funeral of the late ex-Judge Frank J. Taylor, who was shot Sunday by Oswald Hansel, was held from the family residence this afternoon, with the interment in Ocean View Cemetery. The Rev. Father Waters, an intimate personal friend of Judge Taylor, conducted the services. All the city and county offices were closed, every flag in the city was at half mast, the public schools adjourned and a great concourse of friends assembled to pay their respects and followed the body to its last resting place.

**Will Build Cruiser.**  
Astoria, Or., Sept. 18.—Wilson Brothers of this port have been awarded the contract for the construction of the new government cruiser launch, recently called for by the war department, and will begin work thereon as soon as possible. The vessel is to be 82 feet long, of 17 feet beam, and strictly up-to-date in every particular of equipment and furnishings, with mahogany finish in cabins and all appointments in keeping. She is to be powered with a 175 horsepower Atlas engine, six cylinder, the largest gas engine ever handled or sold in this section of the country.
