CHAPTER 179, SECTION 3.

"It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale, any short weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon, shall be plainly marked: 'Eight ounces, full weight,' 'sixteen ounces, full weight,' 'twenty-four ounces full weight,' or 'thirty-two ounces, full weight,' every roll, print or square sold, offered or exposed for sale shall contain the number of ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this act, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine or not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than six months; or both such fine and imprisonment."

GRANGEVILLE WILDWEST SHOW HIS UNDOING.

May Not Be Able to Enter the Field For Some Time.

Grangeville, Idaho, Sept. 18.—Jim Massey and L. W. Minor, of Wallowa, who are here to take part in the wild west show, were injured yesterday in the bucking contests. Minor was so badly hurt that he may be unable to enter the field for some time. He took the sweepstakes here last year. Bertha Blacett, in the cowgirls' bucking contest, won first prize and equalled the cowboys in her daring riding. John Stanley was champion in the Mexican bulldogging contest and is expected to make a world's record during the next three days. Tillie and Johnnie Baldwin are doing trick and fancy riding. Many bucking horses from the Pendleton Round-Up are here. Seven thousand people saw the opening of events yesterday.

Charter Amendments Up.

Eugene, Or., Sept. 18.—A special election for Monday, November 29, was called by the city council at their meeting last night, to submit to the voters of the city three proposed amendments to the city charter. One amendment would authorize the city council to levy a tax of not to exceed 3 mills to provide the city's \$25,000 of the \$75,000 required for an armory.

The second proposition to be submitted is that of authorizing the issuance of \$35,000 of 15-year 5 per cent bonds to provide for funds for the paving of street intersections. Abutting property is charged for the rest of the paved street and the city in general bears the cost of the intersections.

The third proposal is to increase from 5 to 7½ mills the limit of tax that may be levied for the general fund of the city. The people at the April election defeated a proposal to increase the limit from 5 to 10 mills.

Couldn't Get Away.

Albany, Or., Sept. 18.—A daring attempt to escape from an officer was made here yesterday afternoon by Fred Kizer, who is serving a 25-day jail sentence for violation of the "hip-pocket liquor ordinance."

Kizer was taken to a restaurant by Officer All Marshall, for supper. Upon finishing his meal, Kizer made an excuse to go to the rear of the restaurant and escaped. Investigation proved that Kizer had jumped into a buggy with a brother. Officers piled into an automobile and the fugitive was captured four miles north of here.

Sails Over Ocean.

Marshfield, Or., Sept. 18.—Aviator Steele in his hydro aeroplane, Sunday made a record flight for this locality. He reached an altitude of 5700 feet and went out over the ocean for two miles.
