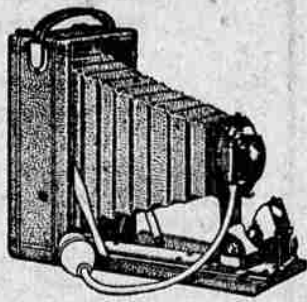

Catholics Revising Bible.

Rome, Sept. 30.—Announcement was made today at the vatican that the Right Rev. Abbot Gasquet, supreme head of the monastic order of the English Benedictines, and who is already in the United States on a visit, has just been intrusted with a special mission there by Pope Pius. It is hoped that Father Gasquet will be able to secure contributions in America that will make possible the complete revision of the bible which the Catholic church now has under way.

The preparing of a revised text of the bible that would stand the test of all modern criticism and research has been one of the greatest ambitions of Pope Pius from the moment he was elected pope ten years ago. The entire amount of money which it was foreseen would be entailed made it impossible for his holiness to undertake the work until 1907 and now with a goodly part of it completed, he is facing the necessity of having to abandon it unless generous subscriptions are forthcoming.

The actual work of the revision was intrusted by Pope Pius in 1907 to the Order of the Benedictines. The work has since been carried steadily on in their monasteries in all parts of the world.

Fads and Fancies in Dress.

Juror Went to Sleep, Judge Lenient.

Baker, Sept. 19.—Desiring to take a half holiday, which they justly deserve, the 12 jurors in the case of J. C. Mathews vs. the O.W. R. & N. railroad company, petitioned his honor, Judge Anderson, for leave of absence to attend the Baker county fair this afternoon. Arrangements were made which were agreeable to both sides in the case and court adjourned this afternoon, to be called again at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Politicians Watch Johnson.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 19.—Political weather forecasters in Washington have been keeping their eyes on the governor's office at Sacramento, ever since the word came across the mountains that Hiram Johnson might decide to cut loose from the republican party name. Interest was heightened when it was announced that Francis J. Heney would run for senator without seeking the support of the party label. The national capital, isolated from the direct political currents of the country, thinks Johnson and Heney are committing political suicide. Probably the example set by all but one of the progressives of the senate—La Follette, Kenyon, Borah, Clapp, Cummins and their associates—has encouraged this view.

Spain Gives Bond.

A warrant was issued for John Spain and Ed. Turk, two noted buckaroos of eastern Oregon, by Frank Pierce, to recover a colt which is said to belong to Pierce and which the cowboys used as a relay horse at the Pendleton Round-Up, says the Baker Herald. The broncho busters were found at Ontario, where they were exhibiting at the county fair, and both put up bonds to the amount of \$100 each for their appearance and for the return of the colt.

The prune crop which is to be plentiful this year, has shown up in local markets in small quantities. Several other varieties of small plums are also selling at fair prices although no large consignments have been received.

Peaches still hold the floor as best sellers with pears running a close second. Apples are arriving which are of a firmer and more lasting variety than the earlier stocks.
