Convict Goods Opposed.

Washington, Sept. 20.—Hearings on the Boomer convict labor bill before the house labor committee bring out the fact that while this measure, offered by a southern democrat, would allow each state to regulate the importation and sale within its borders of convict-made goods, it would in no wise effect the traffic in those states whose legislatures do not effectually regulate or prohibit the sale of such goods.

Representative John I. Nolan's bill on the same subject, which he hopes to get reported from the interstate commerce committee, absolutely prohibits the shipment of any convict-made or convict-packed commodities in interstate commerce. It also prohibits any firm, such for example as a big mail order house, selling convict-made goods, from shipping any goods of the same general description, except they be stamped or labeled "Not made by convict labor," and this stamp be secured upon the filing of an affidavit that the goods were free-made. The stamp is designed to discourage the sale of the products of convict labor, even within the state wherein produced.

A prominent fruit canner, has notified Nolan that the convicts in the Michigan penitentiary at Jackson, are canning tomatoes, peas and beans, which are sold at cut prices.

Appreciates Observer.

Imbler, Ore., Sept. 20.—(To The Editor)—May I ask you to correct an error in your otherwise splendid article in issue of September 15th, relative to apple grades and prices, by giving to the fruit growers of the Grande Ronde valley, through your paper, the information that it is the North Pacific Fruit Distributors that has offered 75c per box for our C Grade apples and not the Exchange?

Both of these organizations are doing a work for the fruit growers which no individual can accomplish for himself and, while I have no desire to discredit the work of the Exchange, which is a stock corporation, I favor the Distributors, which is a mutual or the growers themselves.

We, who believe that organization among fruit growers is the only salvation for maintenance of profitable prices, appreciate the work that is being done by the Observer in giving to the news of the fruit industry of the Pacific Coast and keeping us informed of the amrk conditions all over the world. You are doing for the Grande Ronde valley what the Review is doing for the Spokane valley and I feel that your efforts will be as great a factor in bringing us together in a mutual organization here as the Review has been there.

STEAMER HITS GROUND.

Santa Cruz Strikes Rocky Shore Near Santa Barbara.

Santa Barbara, Cal., Sept. 20.—The steam schooner Santa Cruz went ashore on a rock off Rincon early this morning in a heavy fog, and is pounding to pieces on the rocks. Captain Nidever and his crew of seven are reported to have reached the shore in safety. The captain lost his bearings in the fog.

The crew landed after two attempts in a small boat to gain shore.

Washington, Sept. 20.—For the first time in its history, the California state federation of labor may this year take up the proomtion of a program of federal legislation for the betterment of the condition of the workers. The Fresno convention next month will be asked to consider a series of the most important labor bills and public ownership measures now before congress, and to send to the California representatives and senators, and to the chairman of committees in both houses, a statement of resources for or against their passage.

This step will bring directly to the attention of congress the view held by the labor movement of the progressive Pacific west as to what the workers want today. It will re-enforce the familiar appeals made by the national officers of the American Federation of Labor for the anti-injunction and other long-delayed bills, with a more far-reaching, newer and more aggressive demand.

Now that California has sent John Nolan, prominent in the state federation of labor, to the house, it is proposed by San Francisco unionists that he be given the definite backing of 75,000 trade unionists on the bills for which he and other labor advocates are making a fight.

Eddie Graney, the San Francisco referee, has given out a list of the world's greatest fighters. Graney has refereed or been connected in some other way with scores of the most famous fights on record.

Greatest heavyweight fighters, Peter Jackson and James J. Corbett; greatest middleweight fighters, Bob Fitzsimmons and Jack Dempsey; best wel- ters, Joe Walcott and Tommy Ryan; best lightweights, Jack McAuliffe and Johnny Herget; best featherweights, George Dixon and Terry McGovern; Greatest bantam champion, George Dixon; hardest bitters in the history of the ring, Bob Fitzsimmons, Joe Choynski and Kid McCoy; gamest men he ever saw, Joe Choynski, Jimmy Britt, Bat Nelson and Jack Dempsey.

MORE SUITS FILED.

Seattle Times Editor to Be Brought to Court by Bryan.

Seattle, Sept. 20.—Congressman Bryan filed his second suit for \$50,000 damages for alleged libel against Alden Blethen, editor of the Seattle Times and the Times Printing company. The libel is alleged to have been committed in the recent attack upon the congressman which was printed in the Times, following Bryan's attack upon the editor of the Times in a speech to congress. Among the alleged libelous references, according to the complaint filed, is a reference to him as "Renegade Bryan, one of the most contemptible currs that ever went unwhipped in the community." This is the second suit to be filed in this case.
