### LOCAL WHEAT SALES BRISK

PRICES RANGE FROM 65 CENTS TO 70 CENTS.

Union county wheat is moving with considerable vigor. Island City buyers report a steady sale of wheat at figures ranging from 65 to 70 cents for top grades. At these prices sales have been frequent and substantial. The bearish attitude of eastern states has not reached local circles.

Unchanged in Portland.

Portland, Sept. 24.—Locally the wheat market remains unchanged, but in Chicago it tumbled rapidly. September opened at 87, and at the close had dropped to 85 5-8 cents, and May, which opened at 93 cents, went off a half, closing at 92 1/4 cents. Across the water the market was firm, generally speaking, although Liverpool quotations were an eighth off at the close.

London cables carpoes on passage irregular; English country markets irregular; French country markets firm.

Europe Bears Wheat.

Chicago, Sept. 23.—Decrease of stocks of wheat in Chicago elevators acted as more than an offset for the bearish advices from Australia, Argentina and Russia. The opening varied from one-fourth cent lower to one-eighth cent advance and there was later a slight further hardening of the market.

A huge increase of the world's available supply brought about a substantial break in wheat. There were also assertions that Canada would make wheat free before January 1. The close was nervous, one-half to seven-eighths at one cent under last night.
