Guy Lindsay Trial Is Set.

# SPRAY KILLS LOGUST BORE

## SHADE TREE PEST CAN BE COMBATED.

Late Fall Spraying Will Get at the Root of Boring Evil.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 23.—(Special)—The cutting of the locust tree for all purposes, including thinning operations and for private commercial use, should be done between the first of October and the last of March. To destroy the locust borers before they enter the wood, the removal of the bark from all desirable portions of the trunks of the trees felled is important and necessary. Tops and the thinnings should be burned.

The yellow striped, long horned, winged beetle that produces the devastating borer is found from August to October on trees and the flowers of the goldenrod. During this period eggs are deposited in the crevices of the bark of growing trees and the young borers, after being hatched, pass the winter there and in the spring bore through the bark to the heart of the tree.

The injury to the trees consist of wounds in the bark and sapwood, which if sufficiently severe and repeated year after year, result in a worthless growth or the death of the timber affected. The numerous wormholes in the wood also reduce its commercial value.

The presence of the insects in injurious numbers is indicated at this season of the year by the frequency of the adults on the goldenrod flowers and on the trees. So extensive has the damage of this pest been in some sections of the eastern states and the middle west that it is now considered unprofitable to grow the tree for either shade or timber. One important reason for holding this borer in check is to prevent its extension into the far west and other sections which are at present free from it.

Experiments have demonstrated that the grubs may be killed by spraying the trees and branches with a strong solution of kerosene emulsion. This should be done not earlier than November and not later than March because this spraying when the trees are in leaf will destroy the foliage and check growth.

This emulsion may be prepared as follows:

Kerosene emulsion (soap formula):  
Kerosene ..... gallons 2  
Whale oil soap (or 1 quart soft soap) ..... pound 1/2  
Water ..... gallon 1

The soap, first finely divided, is dissolved in the water by boiling and immediately added boiling hot, away from the fire, to the kerosene. The whole mixture is then agitated violently while hot by being pumped back upon itself with a force pump and direct discharge nozzle throwing a strong stream, preferably one-eighth inch in diameter. After from three to five minutes' pumping the emulsion should be perfect, and the mixture will have increased from one-third to one-half in bulk and assumed the consistency of cream. Well made, emulsion will keep indefinitely and should be diluted only as wanted for use.

For the treatment of large orchards in municipal work requiring larger quantities of the emulsion, it will be advisable to manufacture it with the aid of a steam or gasoline engine, as has been very successfully and economically done in several instances, all the work of heating, churning, etc., being accomplished by this means.

The use of whale oil soap, especially if the emulsion is to be kept for any length of time, is strongly recommended, not only because the soap possesses considerable insecticide value itself, but because the emulsion made with it is more permanent, does not lose its creamy consistency, and is always easily diluted, whereas with most of the other common soaps the mixture becomes cheesy after a few days and needs reheating to mix with water. Soft soap answers very well, and one quart of it may be taken in lieu of the hard soaps.

In limestone regions or where the water is very hard, some of the soap will combine with the lime or magnesia in the water, and more or less of the oil will be freed, especially when

the emulsion is diluted. Before use, such water should be broken with lye, or rain water employed.

For use on locust trees dilute one gallon of emulsion with 2 gallons of soft water.

Pure kerosene and pure petroleum will effectually kill the insects, but may do some damage to the bark of the trees.

Experiments with carbolic emulsion indicates that this preparation is of no value to kill the young grubs.

According to Dr. Howard, Chief of the Bureau of Entomology, the brown and apparently dying condition of the yellow or black locust trees in the state of Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio is caused by the insect known as the locust leaf beetle. Nearly every summer the brownish appearance of these trees attracts attention and causes considerable inquiry and some alarm. However, with a few exceptions, the trees recover and come out fresh and green the following spring.

A more complete description of the locust borer and methods for its control may be obtained from Circular No. 83 of the Bureau of Entomology, which is written by A. D. Hopkins in charge of Forest Insect Investigations. The bulletin contains photographs of the borer.

### Yale Opens With Record Enrollment.

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 25.—The vanguard of what is expected to be the record enrollment at Yale university enrolled here today for the 1913-14 term of the class of 1917. Because there are more seniors this year than ever before, Dean Jones was unable today to make final arrangements for housing them on the campus. Owing to the frequent freshman "rows", card parties and "joy affairs" which were pulled off last year, all freshmen this year will be housed on the campus expecting about sixteen who will have rooms in the new private dormitories

on York street. These dormitories will not only have the usual number of college professors to see that order is maintained, but they will also have janitors and other attendants under college jurisdiction. For the first time a number of seniors will this year be housed in freshmen dormitories.

### Irish Protect Wounded.

Belfast, Ireland, Sept. 25.—Sir Edward Carson, one of the bitterest opponents of Irish Home rule, subscribed \$50,000 toward the \$500,000 fund to indemnify anyone wounded, or the families of those killed in resisting government by an Irish parliament. Some participants in yesterday's conference when "the provisional government of Ulster" was organized, said the Kildare Home rulers tried to seize the Ulster government without awaiting the passage of the Home Rule bill. Should Ireland be given rule, the provisional government proposes to take over the rulership of the province, defying and repudiating the Dublin parliament.

### Fall Injures Baker Lady.

Baker, Sept. 22.—Thrown from her horse, the animal falling upon her, Mrs. T. H. Miller is in St. Elizabeth hospital today with a broken ankle and a badly bruised face and head.

The accident occurred last evening as Mrs. Miller, accompanied by her sister, Mrs. H. R. Elliott, of New York, who is visiting her, had taken their horses from the Weise and Kenyon barn. Mrs. Miller's animal slipped at the intersection of Main street and Valley avenue, throwing its rider violently to the pavement.

The injured woman was taken to the Windom drug store, where medical attention was summoned. Mrs. Miller being afterward taken to the hospital.

Today she is resting easy. Mrs. Miller is the step daughter of Mrs. M. H. Miller and resides on a ranch one and a half miles from Quarts.
