EPPINGER RESTING EASY.

Has Very Good Chance for Recovery From Revolver and Knife Wounds.

Baker, Sept. 26.—Charles Eppinger, yesterday's victim of the knife and revolver of W. W. Hall, is still at the hospital, and his condition is reported as very much improved. Although he passed a sleepless night after midnight owing to pain in his left arm from the bullet wound, no serious complications have arisen and the pain in his chest is scarcely noticeable.

According to the victim's story of the affair, Hall had quit the threshing crew at noon yesterday, giving no notice to the threshers who were short handed. Words followed between the two men with the result that they came to blows, Hall whipping out a gun and firing five shots, two of which took effect.

F. W. Eppinger, a brother of the wounded man, rushed from the house upon hearing the shots and ordered Hall to stop shooting. Hall turned his gun upon F. W. Eppinger, but was finally persuaded to put it into his pocket, later giving himself up to Deputy Sheriff McCord.

It is reported that Eppinger has asked that Hall be not prosecuted because he was at least partly to blame.

Kuhn Men at Baker.

Baker, Sept. 26.—S. Mainland, representing the Kuhn interests in the Idaho-Oregon Power company and traction lines in southern Idaho, arrived in the city yesterday morning from Wisconsin and spent the day in conference with Mr. Ray Nye, head of the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company, who is here from Fremont, Nebraska.

Mr. Mainland has made several visits to Baker in the past from his headquarters in Boise, from which point he directs power and traction movements in the intermountain country. The basis of operations of the Idaho-Oregon Power company is at Oxbow on Snake river, near the town of Copperfield on the line of the Northwest railroad running from Huntington to Homestead.

Suit Is Appealed.

Baker, Sept. 26.—Charles Smith appeared yesterday morning to answer to the charge of the larceny of a suit of clothes belonging to Charles Alexander from the O-W. R. & N. depot in this city.

He was represented by Attorney W. S. Newbury, while C. T. Godwin represented the prosecution.

The jury retired at a late hour this afternoon on the case. Immediately following this trial, the divorce suit of Roberts vs. Roberts, was called.
