Lane County Fair Opened.

Eugene, Or., Sept. 25.—The annual exhibition of the Lane County Fair association began Wednesday with record crowds for the first day. If the weather remains good the attendance probably will be a third greater than at any previous fair here, judging from the interest manifested.

The large pavilion is filled to its capacity with the finest display of products of the farm, the garden, the orchard, the household, the schools, the stock pens and art galleries ever gathered together under one roof in this part of the state. The school exhibit is badly crowded, so spontaneous was the response for a display. A separate building for this department will probably be erected in the near future.

The stock pens are all filled for the first time and the poultry display is larger than last year.

The eugenics contest is attracting a great deal of attention today. Two classes of youngsters are being examined today. A total of over 175 entries was received and it is necessary to divide the list so that examinations will be held each forenoon and afternoon till Saturday.

Thursday is pioneer day. The early settlers are playing a monster reunion and banquet. Each of the larger cities of the county has a day at the fair.

The number of race horses here to take part in the speed contests exceeds the number ever assembled here before. Some of the fastest animals in the state are on the programme.

Water Pure; Taste Is Bad.

Eugene, Or., Sept. 22.—Immediate construction of a pipeline from the pumping plant of the Eugene water system to temporary wells located in the gravel across the river was ordered yesterday by the Eugene water board. This action was taken in order to secure water that will not have the disagreeable taste, it is charged, due to gas or tar seepage, which the present supply has. The pipeline now to be constructed will be of a temporary nature, to be succeeded next spring by a larger pipe laid in concrete and connecting with more elaborate wells.

The present intake is located opposite the gas plant of the Oregon Power Company, and it is charged that the unpleasant taste in the water is due to coal tar, which seeps into the river. Biological tests show that the filtered water is very pure, but the taste survives the filtering process.

Woman Kills Intruder.

Bend, Or., Sept. 22.—Tomo Sealpara was shot and killed Saturday by Mrs. Peter Rizzi under circumstances which are somewhat puzzling to the authorities. Rizzi returned to dinner today and found Sealpara dead on the floor, his breast torn by shot and his head pillowed on a tin pan.

Mrs. Rizzi said she had shot Sealpara for making improper remarks to

her, after which, she said, she took her baby and fled. Rizzi says the tin pan was under the slain man's head when he entered the room. Mrs. Rizzi says she doesn't know how it got there. The coroner's jury is investigating and it is believed the entire details of the tragedy have not been heard.

Mrs. Parker Dead.

Mrs. Thomas Parker died September 26th at her home on North Fir street and will be buried this afternoon from the home. Reverend Adams of the Christian church, officiating. Mrs. Parker has been ill for some time and moved to La Grande about a year ago hoping to find relief in this climate, but she grew gradually worse until the end, which was not unexpected to her friends and relatives.
